SUCCEDERE A WILSON

Il Nuovo Presidente Degli S. U.
Prende Oggi il Giuramento di Rito

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Authorized by the act of October 6,
1917, on the part of the Postmaster of Phila-
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Oggi Warren Gamaliel Harding,
zetto della colonia della nazione a
Presidente degli Stati Uniti, prendera
il giuramento del suo ufficio alla Casa Bianca
con una cerimonia semplice quanto
quella che la storia narra nei riguardi
del primo Presidente Giorgio Washing-
ton. Per personale desiderio di Mr.
Harding la cerimonia sara' una delle
piu' semplici, mai comitato congres-
sionale per l'inaugurazione ha disposto
per la scorta che dovrà accompagnare
il nuovo presidente dal "Hotel over-
lodge" al Capitolo ed alla Casa
Bianca.

In occasione della presa di possesso
di altri presidenti questi furono scortati
da una grande processione militare e
civile, la quale fara' contrasto con
il semplice squadrone di cavalleria as-
segnato per la scorta di Harding. La
cerimonia avra' luogo poco dopo del
mezzogiorno. Il cortese presidente
del New Willard Hotel si rechera' alla
Casa Bianca per prendere Mr. Wilson
e quindi procedera' per il Senato, ove
il nuovo presidente prendera' il giura-
mento di rito. Per il giuramento sara'
nata la stessa Bibbia che sara' per
Giorgio Washington. Detta Bibbia e'
una copia di una legge massonica di
New York e sara' recata a Washington
da un apposito comitato.

Warren G. Harding fu eletto con una
maggioranza schiacciante sopra il can-
didato democratico e fu definita una
vittoria condanna alla politica di Wilson.
Con la presa di possesso di Harding
si chiude un'era nuova in l'Am-
ministrazione Pubblica di questa grande
Nazione.

N. J. RAISES RAIL TAXES

Companies to Pay More Than Mil-
lion Increase to State

Princeton, March 4.—The final assess-
ment of railroad property of the state
to the state board of taxes and assess-
ment has been filed with the state com-
ptroller, it was announced today, with a
total increase in valuation over the 1920
assessment of \$12,000,000, and a total
increase in railroad taxation over last
year of \$1,300,000.
The state board has just now com-
pleted the hearing of appeals on the
part of railroad companies, and as a
result of these appeals the board an-
nounced these were total reductions in
valuation amounting to \$630,000. In
the course of today the assess-ment shows
a total valuation of first and second
class property for 1921 of \$290,220,188,
as against \$272,218,081 for 1920. The
total tax to be paid by the railroads in
state purposes will amount to \$8,282,-
747 as against \$7,155,495 for 1920.
The amount of money that the local
 taxing boards receive as a result of this
assessment will be \$1,322,318, as
against \$1,015,508 for 1920.

HARDING'S SISTER PLEADS

Mrs. Rensberg Asks Leniency for
New York Thief

New York, March 4. If Clarence
Chowder, who pleaded guilty yesterday
of the theft of \$207.75, be released on
suspended sentence by General Sessions
Judge Mulgrew it will be due to the
pleading of a sister of President
Warren Harding, her cousin and a New
York broker.

Chowder, an overseas veteran, was
brought back yesterday by Detective
Connelley from Vancouver. They re-
turned by steamship by way of New
Orleans.

In the boat they met Mrs. Ethel
Rensberg of Santa Anna, Calif., sister
of Mr. Harding, and her cousin Mrs.
Clara Jacobson. They were on their
way to Washington for the inaugura-
tion. They and Mrs. H. Perry, a law-
yer, sympathized with the prisoner,
Connelley said, and did their best to
make him more comfortable. Perry said
yesterday.

"If Chowder gets another chance I
will see that he gets a job and is put
in a position to repay Ford & Taylor
what he stole."

CAN'T WED SON'S FIANCEE

French Woman Is to Be Deported,
Pennsylvanian Learns

New York, March 4. Carrying a
passport, a bouquet and other gifts to
Ella Deppert yesterday, Henry G.
Deppert of Philadelphia, Pa., was
deported to London that his intended
bride was listed for deportation.
The story is this: Deppert's son, as a
soldier in France, fell in love with Miss
Ella Deppert, although both had
other partners. After World War I, Deppert
in America his French fiancee secured a
divorce in hopes of marrying him.
But the former soldier said no, where-
upon his father undertook to fulfill the
obligation. Miss Deppert came to
America and is now ready to marry the
son. Deppert if the latter's appeal to
Washington is granted.
