Given to Radicals, Police Declare

Following a spectacular raid yester-day afternoon, when seven alleged radi-cals were arrested, police of the Tweifth and Pine streets station, again raided New Garrick Hall, 507 South Eighth street, at 6:30 o'clock this morning, broke up a meeting of the Amaigamated Cloth Workers of the World, and ar-

cloth Workers of the rested one man.

It is charged by Lieutenant Theodore Fenn that a permit issued to the cloth workers was turned over by them to a group of radicals for yesterday's meeting, and that the cloth workers attempted to hold this morning's meet-

attempted to hold this morning's meeting without a permit.
Following yesterday's raid, in which quantities of literature said to be seditious were seized. Lieutenant Fenn placed the hall under the surveillance of Sergeant McCort and Patrolman Aver-

ett.
Shortly after 6 o'clock Sergeant McCort saw several persons enter the hall.
He discovered nearly 100 men and
women gathered. Lights had not been
turned on and the hall was in semidarkness.

Two Given Sentences Samuel Di Fillips and Joseph Boliva, the former of 2826 North Van Pelt street, and the latter of 818 Fitzwater street, were arrested and sentenced to acre five days in the county prison for linesterly conduct.

Two detectives reported to Lieutenant Fenn that inside the program there had been issued a small handbill condemning the arrests several weeks ago of Frank Di Sace and Eugene Vanetti, two Massachusetts radicals, held for alleged anarchistic meetings and for distributing alleged seditious literature.




