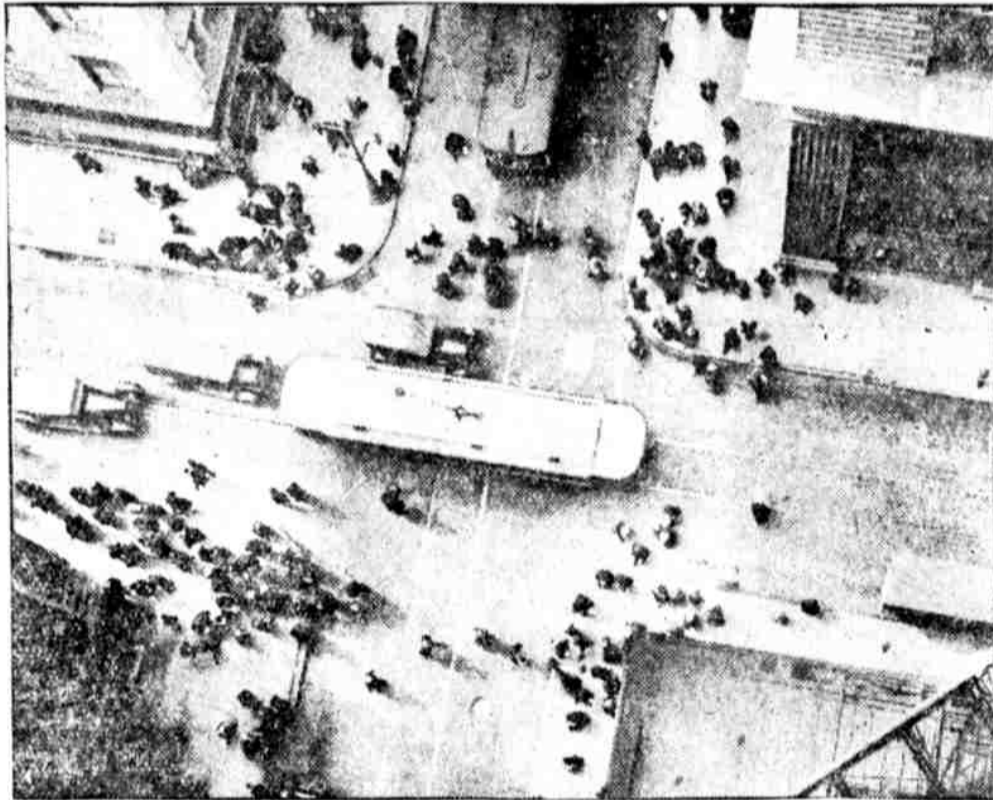

MISS E. L. ACKERMAN, of the Industrial Society, of Hoboken, N. J., was here on Saturday to attend the conference of girls' clubs.

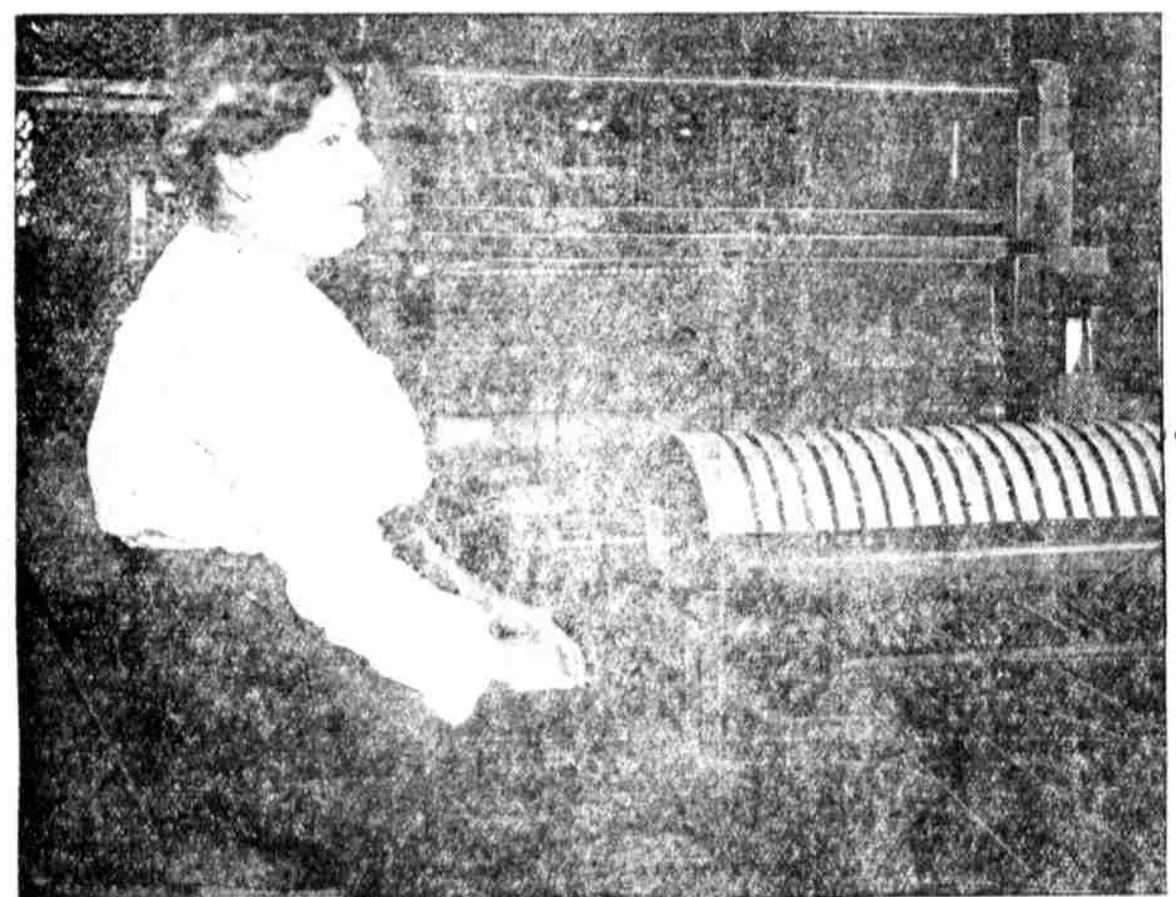
