

## COMBINE PREPARES TO PUNISH DEVELIN

His "Interference" in Weglein Short-Term Loan Bill Represented in Council

### SPONSOR GETS ALL CREDIT

Vary members of the Council yesterday joined in a fusillade of protest against Mr. Weglein, who was not invited from Harrisburg to attend the meeting of the president of the Pennsylvania body, termed the "Daily short-term bill for repaying."

Then, before a score of half-clad faces, they turned on one of their leaders, James A. Devlin, chairman of the committee on finance and insurance and co-chairman of an informal no-punishment committee.

His committee is responsible for the strike off a clause which would have defined its power and jurisdiction over all matters pending before the Legislature at the time of a general election or changes affecting the taxability and extent of Pennsylvania taxes.

The proposal is to the effect of a resolution to amend the laws of the state. It will move to start sometime next week before coming to a vote. Mr. Devlin is an "outsider," while Mr. Weglein even has a good relationship with the "in" crowd.

Congratulations were accorded Mr. Weglein for his skill in getting the bill through the State Capitol. A motion by Mr. Devlin, however, was taken to have Mr. Weglein sit with the "in" crowd, the Department of Public Works, on a Pennsylvania pensioning program, was voted down. Vary members insisted that Pensions Action should prepare the program without interference.

Three bills, which it is proposed to permit the Department of Welfare to enclose in its departmental budgets of the Municipal Court, were introduced. Vary moved, under the auspices of Councilman McNamee. Among other things, the bills provide for the creation of several positions in the Bureau of Legal Aid under the Welfare Department.

Devolving vote the bill to remove the great firehouse on South Chestnut street, between Tenth and Broad streets, was passed.
