Voters' League Decides on "Rumpus" at Harrisburg for Measures It Favors

JANE ALLEN'S PROPOSAL

The Pennsylvania League of Women Voters has decided to launch "a well-organized rumpus" at Harrisburg to force the passage of "certain riders" necessary for measures which the women favor.

Miss Jane Allen, president of the Philadelphia Teachers' Association, addressed the "rumpus" at the University conference of the League of Women Voters at the University of Pennsylvania yesterday.

Miss Allen's address of a rumpus was based on part of an address by Charles A. Snyder, state treasurer.

Dr. Penniman on the Bible. Wealth of Poetry Found in Job, the Speaker Says. Continuing his series of talks on "The Bible as Literature," Dr. Josiah H. Penniman, acting provost of the University of Pennsylvania, spoke in the foyer of the Academy of Music yesterday on "The Wisdom Literature of the Bible," basing his talk on the books of Proverbs, Job, Judges and Numbers.

In pointing out the poetry hidden in the Old Testament books, particularly in Job, he said: "For height and depth in poetry, the book of Job is unequalled by any human literature."

Of the application of the teaching of the "wisdom books" of the Bible, to present problems, the speaker said: "Much of the instruction which is given in the wisdom books is not of a strictly literal nature, but on things of this world of the here and now."
