

STILLMAN'S SUIT BASED ON LETTER

Wife Said to Have Written Appeal for Forgiveness Nearly Three Years Ago

BELIEVED IN FAIR PLAY

New York, March 22.—A "long, painful" letter which Mrs. Anne Underhill Potter Stillman wrote to her husband, James A. Stillman, president of the National City Bank of New York, is an alleged element in the banker's suit against his wife and youngest son, Guy Stillman. The notes were written three years ago this morning and before the birth of the Stillmans, now twenty-eight months old.

This was disclosed by one who had read the letter and who has since been in conference with Mrs. Stillman. Coupled with the disclosure came the assurance that the attorney for the former, Pitt Rivers, would exhaust every legal device to keep the letter from being admitted as evidence in the suit.

Strangers enough, said this man, no exact notion resulted for nearly two years. He represented the letter as resulting in the possession of the banker on July 1, 1920, when he started his divorce suit.

Lawyers who were informed of the letter and its contents were of the opinion that supporting evidence of the legal equipment of a man. Neither side, they explained, would be entitled to a degree of divorce, because the law requires that both parties come into court with clean hands.

Mrs. Stillman's letter is described as a document that would affect the divorce suit. Mrs. Stillman and her lawyer have the stand that it admits that the impetuous, angry and burning son-in-law, who is now in the North Woods, sixteen years younger than his adult son, was permitted.

This conclusion of the case, it was noted, would still leave the paternity of the Stillman child, but no end can be written to the Stillman case that falls definitely to establish the legal status of the infant, it was said.

John E. Mack of Philadelphia, guardian of the child, is expected to be on hand at White Plains tomorrow when it is said there is a possibility that an effort may be made to introduce the letter in relation to the motion to file counsel fee and alimony.

According to reports of the law, Mrs. Stillman's letter, which was written one year ago, is said to have been in the possession of the Stillman child, who is now in the North Woods, sixteen years younger than his adult son, was permitted.

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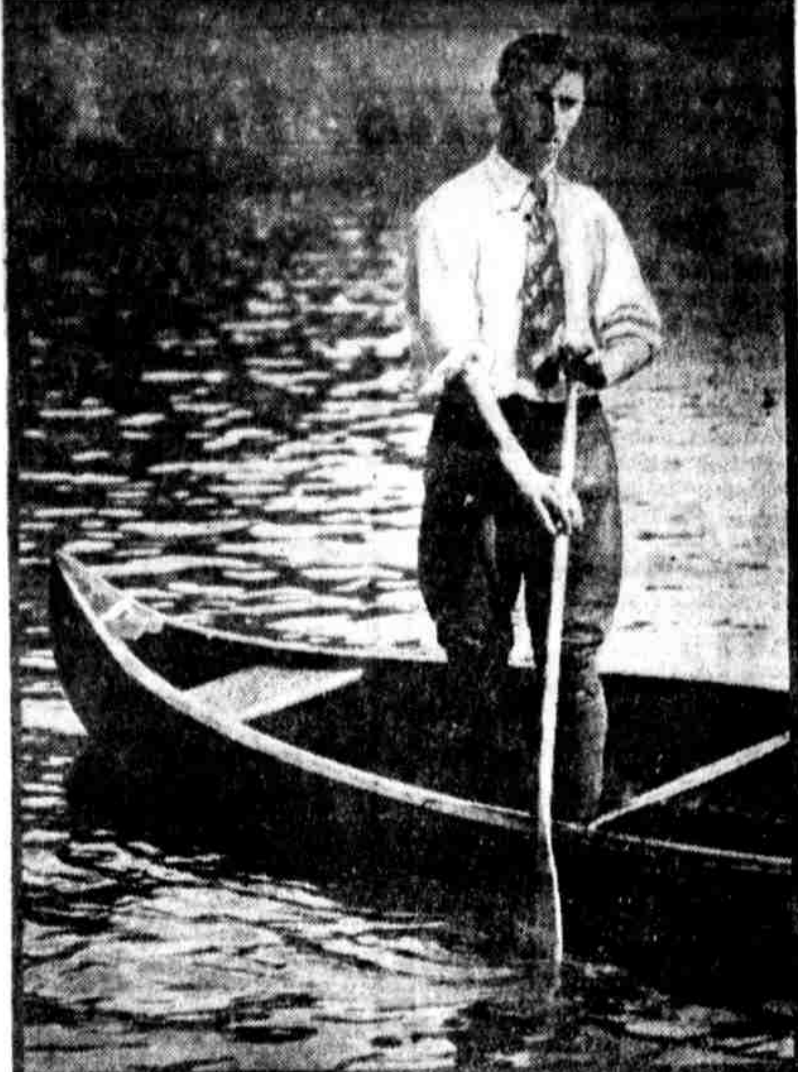

GEN. WOOD CHOSEN U. OF P. PRESIDENT

Institution's Activities to Be Divided Between Him and Penniman

LATTER NAMED PROVOST

Major General Leonard Wood will be made president of the University of Pennsylvania and Dr. Josiah H. Penniman, acting provost, will be chosen provost and head of the educational activities.

This is in accordance with plans now being formulated by the board of trustees. The board held its March meeting yesterday and unanimously endorsed the plan stated. General Wood will be elected "head" of the University at the next meeting of the board on April 18.

Then, upon the return of the general from the Philippines, where he is going to make a survey of conditions for President Harding, a conference between him, the trustees and Dr. Penniman will take place.

To Confer Title of President
At that meeting, it is said, the title of president of the University will be conferred upon him and that of provost upon Dr. Penniman. The various duties that will devolve upon each of the men will also be determined at the conference. It is the expressed desire of the trustees that Dr. Penniman shall represent the faculty in the University's administration.

The board of trustees in its statement indicated that it was eager to retain Dr. Penniman as head of the educational activities of the University and expressed the desire that the University will be served by both these distinguished men through years of hearty and effective co-operation.

The trustees declared that "important as is the administrative aspect of the office of head of the University, the purely educational aspect is of no less importance" and that "the University would be untrue to its great traditions if it were ever to mistake educational machinery for intellectual life."

The statement, in full, was as follows: "The board of trustees of the University of Pennsylvania in announcing the nomination of Leonard Wood to be the head of the University desire to make public acknowledgement of the loyal and effective service rendered to the University by the acting provost, Dr. Josiah H. Penniman. Without his aid during the long and difficult period following Dr. Smith's resignation it would have been impossible for the trustees to conserve the morale of the institution and successfully to administer its affairs. By his willing and unselfish service Dr. Penniman has earned and will receive the gratitude of every Pennsylvanian man."

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University would be untrue to its great traditions if it were ever to mistake educational machinery for intellectual life. Dr. Penniman has identified himself with all that is best in the life of the institution and is a fit representative of the men of scholarship and culture who compose its faculties. Because he and General Wood have like conceptions of the University as an institution of higher learning, the trustees express earnest hope that the University will be served by both these distinguished men through years of hearty and effective co-operation.

Another meeting is necessary to elect General Wood because of the provisions of the University's charter. The general, who is a Harvard graduate, received the honorary degree of doctor of laws of the University of Pennsylvania in 1903, when he was the orator at the University day exercises. Announcement was made of the resignation of Hampton L. Carson, formerly attorney general of Pennsylvania, as a member of the board of trustees. Mr. Carson was the first trustee elected under the provision by which alumni were permitted to fill all vacancies. He gave the press of his legal affairs as the reason for his action.

The matter of the future policy of the University was not formally brought up at the meeting. Presentation of the Morgan report on relationship between the University and the state is postponed until further conferences between the Morgan committee and Governor Sproul and Dr. Thomas E. Finegan.
