University Publication and Class Leaders Join in Praise of Future President

PENNIMAN LAUDED ALSO

A cordial endorsement of General Wood as head of the University of Pennsylvania and the expression of the opinion that "the trustees could have chosen no better man" are contained in an editorial in today's Pennypaper.

This campus daily goes on to say that the task of running the University is too great for one man, and advocates the retention of Dr. Josiah Penniman, as chief educator, as chief educator.

Class presidents also give hearty endorsement of the general in letters to a new column on the front page of the Pennypaper, to be known as "Campus Query Column."

The editorial in the Pennypaper is as follows: "The nomination of General Wood as chief executive of the University of Pennsylvania is virtually an election. And, of course, it is assumed that when the famous soldier consulted with several members of the board last week, he would accept were the position offered him."

As was pointed out several weeks ago, it is entirely too much work for one man to undertake. Dr. Penniman has won the everlasting regard of alumni, faculty and students by the masterful way with which he met the difficult situation. With the loyal assistance of Mr. Merriek he has done the work of five ordinary mortals for nearly a year.

A distribution of the work in running Pennsylvania is a possible solution. Dr. Penniman should be given every opportunity to carry on his work as chief educator of the University, unhampered by financial difficulties and worries.

The nomination of General Wood as chief executive comes as the result of a search by the alumni subcommittee on the provost to find a strong leader with a world-wide reputation to pull the University out of its difficulties. The consensus of opinion is that they could have chosen no better man. General Wood is a man who will be idolized by the students and respected by the graduates.

MRS. FELS DONATES \$600,000 FOR HOME

Philadelphia Woman Contributes to Fund to Build Institution in Palestine

URGES SINGLE TAX ADOPTION

Mrs. Joseph Fels, widow of Joseph Fels, of this city, according to dispatches from London, has donated \$600,000 to the fund for reconstruction of the Jewish national home. This fund is known as the Palestine foundation, and is expected to reach \$125,000,000.

Sir Alfred Mond, in announcing the bequest, said he would devote the remainder of his life and energies to building a great edifice where the temple of Solomon stood.

Mrs. Fels has been in England, trying to impress upon Zionist leaders the necessity of installing the single tax system in the new nation of Palestine. This system, she firmly believes, will

lead to the rehabilitation of the Holy Land more quickly than any other.

In a recent letter to friends in this city Mrs. Fels wrote: Zionism has taken on a new aspect since the liberation of Palestine, and the promise of the British Government that the land shall not be given back to the Turks.

"Palestine is in a way a new land, undeveloped in the modern sense, and not densely populated. The commission that has charge of the restoration is confronted with two problems—first, how to get hold of the land, and second, how to find the revenues to pay the enormous cost of reconstruction.

"By applying the proved principles of political economy and taxing land values the repatriated people will have access to the land, and they will have at the same time ample revenue to meet the cost of government. The men and women who will have charge of this work will avoid the mistakes that have been made in this and other countries, where governments and private enterprises have made improvements for the public, only to find that the owners of the land have reaped the benefit, while a large part of the cost has been laid upon producers who have already been victimized by land speculators.

"Here lies the opportunity for the Jew to demonstrate a great truth to the world by uniting the Mosiac principle of land ownership with a just system of taxation."

Mrs. Fels intends to visit Palestine, and to adopt a Jewish orphan there. She will bring the child to this country, to become her heir.
