EDWARDS VETOES

Van Ness Measure, Backed by Anti-Saloon League, Up Again Next Monday

TO DEFER 10-CENT FARE

Trenton. March 23.—Governor Edwards last night returned to the Assembly the Van Ness prohibition enforcement bill by which the Anti-Saloon League proposed that New Jersey should enforce the eighteenth amendment in New Jersey. The vetoed bill will be taken up next Monday night in the Assembly.

Before the Legislature adjourned for the week the joint legislative committee appointed to devise means to raise money to complete the state's highway system and institutional building program made its reports.

The committee recommended the issuance of \$50,000,000 of highway bonds and \$14,000,000 bonds by the Department of Institutions and Agencies.

Both houses adopted a concurrent resolution for the Legislature to adjourn Friday, April S, at 3 p. m.

Confirmation of Governor Edwards' new public utility commission was followed by the board members taking office at once. John J. Treacy, of Jersey City, was elected president.

The board allowed a second three months' suspension in the case of the Trenton and Mercer County Traction Co., so that the proposed ten-cent trolley fare cannot become effective until May 28.

Awaiting action of the Legislature on the Franklin bill to permit the utility board to suspend for six months the ten-cent trolley fare of the Public Service Railway Co., the utility board took no definite action in the Public Service's case. If the bill is not passed the board will suspend the Public Service ten-cent fare until July 1. The present three months' suspension order expires April I.

The House is expected to concur in the Senate's action in overriding the governor's veto of the Case state constabulary bill when the Legislature meets again on Monday night.




