

### CHESS CONTENDERS OBSERVE HOLIDAYS

Lasker and Capablanca Put Off Fifth Match Till Next Tuesday

#### DETAILS OF FOURTH GAME

Havana, March 25.—The fifth game of the international chess match between Dr. Emanuel Lasker and Jose R. Capablanca, which was to have started last night, has been postponed until next Tuesday night.

It is said the postponement was agreed to because of the fact that Good Friday and Sunday are holidays which are especially observed in the Latin countries.

The shortest of the series so far and going only to thirty moves, the fourth game of the championship chess match played at the Mariano Casino, between Dr. Emanuel Lasker and Jose R. Capablanca, was contested along the lines of the first and second games, no far as the few opening moves were concerned.

There was no special point of interest until Dr. Lasker advanced his queen's pawn by exchanging, which in due course he forced upon the rook's file and held possession of it until the end of the game.

It meant nothing to him, however, in the way of advantage. With his twenty-first move, Dr. Lasker made a threatening sortie with his queen, but even this had been foreseen by Capablanca, who had an adequate defense ready.

When the pieces were exchanged at the twenty-fourth turn and, four moves later, each parted company with one of his rooks. There remained little to play for and after Dr. Lasker had made his thirtieth move, a draw was agreed upon. The score:

### HERMAN STOPS ADAMS

Former Bantam Champ Disposes of Westerner in First Round

New York, March 25.—Pete Herman, former bantamweight champion, last night knocked out George Adams, of Chicago, in the first round of a fifteen-round bout here. It was Herman's first match since he knocked out Jimmy Wilde, British flyweight champion.

Adams took the count of eight after receiving a right to the jaw and went down for the full count from the effects of hard body blows. The time was 2 minutes 55 seconds.

Sen Prince, by repeating his last race, should defeat Pastoreau and Walnut Hall in the handicap at Havana today, it being the fourth race on the card. The race is at a mile and a sixteenth for a purse of \$3000. Horses in good condition in other races are: First, Dixie Flyer, George Arthur Middleton; second, Nepe, San Diego, Slippery River; third, Perhaps, Black Top, Rosette; fifth, Duke Ruf, Puncetual, Hualt, sixth, Second Coast, War Tax, May Rose.

The move against oral betting at race tracks in the New York Legislature is a natural sequence to the propaganda undertaken by certain New York sport writers in behalf of the bookmakers against tracks in other states having state commissions in control of racing under pari-mutuel rules.

The bill passed by the Missouri Legislature permitting race meetings may be vetoed by Governor Hyde, who says he will disapprove the measure if it is calculated to encourage gambling and betting. In the old days Missouri had high-class racing at St. Louis, but the methods of betting caused a stigma against the sport. It got to be worse than Havana.

The main track at Belmont Park has been opened for work, which was quickly taken advantage of by trainers. The course is being used for the regular training course in a better way than it has been in the past. The track will be used solely for racing.

The best stable of race horses to come down from the East for the spring season of the Harford Agricultural and Breeding Association, which will begin at Havre de Grace on April 15, to ship out the month is that of Willie Sharpe Kilmer. The Kilmer boys have arrived in the city of Baltimore, Md., to near Highamton, under the name of Mr. Kilmer, in Baltimore, the winner of one Kentucky Derby, two Saratoga cups, two Pimlico cups, one Leacock Club cup and several other prizes, which sum brought his total of earnings up above the \$100,000 mark. He is out with \$200,000 before he finishes with racing.

Mr. Kilmer has a good three-year-old colt in his stable, a son of Cook of the Walls and Private Plug, which raced with some success last season. His horse is improved in physique since he raced in Maryland last November. He looks like fresh timber.

London Promoter Wants Dempsey

New York, March 25.—Negotiations looking toward the appearance of Jack Dempsey in a London fight against a champion in progress here. According to a statement by Dempsey's manager, the promoter of the fight has been offered an opportunity to meet the winner of the Bombarier Welt-Joe fight contest, which will be staged at the London Olympia May 10.

### SIX AMATEUR RING CHAMPS CROWNED

box for national laurels in that city on April 11 and 12. It was necessary for Dan Gartin to box three times before he was finally proclaimed champion. The first time he boxed, Gartin knocked out Peter McGurk, of North Penn. In the second round. He then met Harry Singleton, of Norristown, whom he knocked out in the first round. The last man the Meadowbrook star was pitted against went three fast cantos, Frank McDonald losing the decision.

Two men are what may be called "Jack" champions. In other words, they had their bouts forfeited to them. The boys given the championship through this medium were Joe Guinan, of the Kaywood C. C., and Joe Mulligan, who falls from the same piece. Guinan, won his title when Tony McLoughlin was unable to go on with his bout on account of a fractured nose. He suffered this injury in an earlier bout. J. A. Lucas, of the University of Pennsylvania, did not show up and Mulligan was awarded the decision.

What is believed to be the closest bit of friendship ever shown in a Philadelphia ring occurred in the final of the 115-pound class. "Chick" Weasly and Willie Sullivan, both of the De Neri C. C., stilled through the first minute of the opening round.

Referee Lew Bailey seeing that the boys were not giving their best, declared the bout no contest. After much debate, the judges, "Doc" Shell and John Libbey, decided to give the boys another chance. Although Weasly did not try his best he clearly outpointed Sullivan and won the title.

Williamson Scores Knockout

Atlantic City, March 25.—Max Williamson, of Philadelphia, scored a technical knockout over Johnny Perkins, also of Philadelphia, in the fourth round of their scheduled eight-round bout in the wind-up attraction at the North Side A. C. In the fourth round Perkins scored three knockouts in the ring to save him from a further mauling. Joe Marks, of Philadelphia, with an eight-round advantage, outpointed Carter Moore, of New York city, in the eight-round semi-finals. Billy Davis, also of Philadelphia, in the curtain-raiser of six rounds. Leo Chick, of New York, beat the Kaywood star on Joe Brock, of Philadelphia, after less than two minutes of fighting in the opening round.

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W. T. TILDEN WITHDRAWS  
Champion Unable to Defend Indoor Tennis Title Owing to Illness  
New York, March 25.—William T. Tilden, 24, national outdoor and indoor tennis champion, will not defend his covered court laurels in the national singles championship tournament which starts tomorrow at the Seventh Regiment Armory.

He informed W. Dickson Cunningham, chairman of the tournament committee, through Vincent Richards yesterday, that he was ill at his home in

Philadelphia with a severe cold and would hence be unable to compete. There is still hope, however, that Tilden may join with Richards in defense of their doubles championship. The doubles will not be started until next Tuesday, and it is hoped that by that time Tilden will be so far recovered as to be able to play.

Mellor in Auto Marathon  
Detroit, Mich., March 25.—Chuck Mellor, the Olympic star and World Champion, another noted long-distance runner, is among the six men entered by the Saginaw Square A. C. of Chicago, for the six-day city marathon, to be staged over the Pontiac-Detroit highway April 2 by the Irish-American Athletic Club here.

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
