business institutions and business men do not post their mail until late in the day. The result is tons of mail are dumped into letter boxes and the post-office between the hours of 4 and 7 o'clock. Between those hours the carlers are overworked, trucks are over-loaded, clerks in the postoffice are rushed and consequently the mail is delayed. It is frequently necessary for carriers and trucks to make a second round of their districts because they are unable to handle the bulk of mail on their first round.

Heads of these institutions regard the proposal as a simple remedy for one of the worst evils of the postal service the congestion of mails at the end of business days.

Mr. Hays cannot be credited with having been the originator of the system he proposes to have adopted by business men and institutions throughout the country. Large corporations, such as the Pennsylvania Railroad, the Philatelphia and Reading Railway and other oncerns long ago learned that if they posted mails at hourly intervals its ollection and delivery was greatly facilitated.

That fact is not realized by ordinary business men, bankers, lawyers and multitudes of tradesmen and, therefore, the postal service is congested late in the day, collections are delayed and dePav



The same machinery which is functioning now would function under the new order, but its labors would be more equitably distributed.

N. B. Kelly, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, not only indersed Mr. Hays' plan, but said the Chamber of Commerce would co-operate with the postal officials in making it effective. The forthcoming bulletin of the chamber will contain an explanation of the bill and a recommendation that it be put into effect by all business men.
