

MOSCOW ASKS ALL EXILES TO RETURN

Soviet Government Implores Intelligence to Aid in Reconstruction

SHIPS LOADED FOR TRADE

Helsinki, March 28.—The Moscow and Petrograd Bolshevik newspapers of March 22 and 24, received here yesterday, print an official announcement a vivid picture of what appears to be a sweeping attempt to conciliate the opponents of the Soviets without the latter surrendering political control. An appeal by the Soviet Government to Russian refugees abroad...

"Russia in her reconstruction work must rely not only upon her working men, but also upon her peasants and her intellectuals. Therefore her new international relations obligate Russia to alter her former stand regarding emigrants. The question of the moment is to utilize the forces of these Russian refugees abroad, as their aid is most important in the work of reconstruction."

At editorial in the Pravda of Moscow denounces the fall of the government to care properly for the intellectuals at home and it promises that they will have better treatment and that good relations have been taken as to their future.

It is, however, officially denied that Premier Lenin had conferred with the leaders of the coalition government and the revolutionists with a view to the formation of a coalition government, as had been reported.

Tenants' sailors from the battleship Sebastopol, including sub-captain Denierin, were executed immediately after they had been sentenced by a revolutionary tribunal in Petrograd on March 20, according to the Krasnaya Gazeta. They were tried on the charge of having been ringleaders of the episode and because their bombardment from the warship had caused thousands of casualties, it was declared. No mention is made by the newspaper of the fate of the other 1400 prisoners in Peterhof.

SIBERIA APPEALS FOR RECOGNITION BY U. S.

Tokio, March 28.—(By A. P.) Communications expressing a desire to open diplomatic relations with Japan, the United States and China have been sent to the capitals of those nations by the Russian Far Eastern republic, says a Vladivostok dispatch to the Jiji Shimpu.

The China Government has also issued a declaration to the world demanding that foreign interference in its affairs cease, and that foreign troops evacuate eastern Siberia, it being claimed that their presence there is a violation of international law.

The dispatch declares some delegates to the constituent assembly of the republic have denounced the action of the government in ending a part of the peninsula of Kamohatka to the Soviet Government of Moscow, asserting that this action will result in placing the region in the hands of American capitalists and in inducing Japan to take aggressive measures at the mouth of the Amur.

U. S. RUSSIAN POLICY APPROVED IN LONDON

London, March 28.—(By A. P.) Agreement with the principles enunciated by Charles E. Hughes, American secretary of state, in his reply to overtures for a trade agreement by the Russian Bolshevik Government is expressed by the Daily Mail in commenting on the situation. The newspaper says the British Government's attitude in concluding an agreement for the opening of trade relations with

Soviet Russia contrasts strikingly with America's decision. "President Harding," declares the newspaper, "distrusts Bolshevik diplomacy and has no time in rejecting Lenin's overtures. It is certain Great Britain will find herself at variance with the Bolsheviks sooner or later. It is obvious that Russia will have to be kept well up to her undertakings to abstain from hostile action and from spreading propaganda against the British Empire."

Public opinion here will remain disquieted until the terms of the Soviet treaty which touch India most nearly—those relating to Afghanistan—have been fully disclosed.

BERLIN ASKS ARBITRATION OF AERONAUTIC DISPUTE

Holds Treaty Does Not Forbid Manufacture of Aerial Berlin, March 28.—(By A. P.)—The German Government, replying today to an invitation from the Rhineland aeronautic commission as to whether manufacturers of aeronautical material still were supported by the German authorities in their continued violation of the entente's decision, proposes that the matter be referred to arbitration.

The German Government states that it adheres to its standpoint that the Versailles treaty did not give the allies the right to prolong the embargo on manufacture and importation of aeronautical material beyond July 10, 1920.

Paris, March 28.—(By A. P.)—Examination of the report of Paul Tirard, high commissioner for the Rhineland and president of the Rhineland commission regarding the new customs zone on the east bank of the Rhine, will take place on Tuesday, says the Echo de Paris.

The report was to have been considered on Friday, but an adjournment was made unavoidable by the fact that members of the British ministry had left London for their Easter vacations.

FIRES IN ENGLAND LAID TO SINN FEIN

Wave of Incendiarism Alarms British Capital—Wales May Open Ulster House

DUBLIN SUBURBS RAIDED

By the Associated Press London, March 28.—A campaign of incendiarism in various parts of the country is assuming such proportion that the authorities of Scotland Yard are mobilizing a fleet of motorcars and lorries to rush men to any point where there is a call for their services. This plan is similar to one adopted here recently when many incendiary fires were set in London.

The Evening Standard asserts that further Sinn Fein plots to destroy farm buildings on the outskirts of London have been discovered.

Special detectives were posted last night outside of government buildings and No. 10 Downing street, the official home of Prime Minister Lloyd George, and special precautions were taken by the Bank of England.

Farm buildings numbering twenty were burned in the Newcastle district, while other fires occurred at St. Albans and in Hertfordshire, Bedfordshire and Buckinghamshire. Near the ruins at a number of places empty oil cans were discovered.

It was reported here today on excellent authority that the Prince of Wales would open the new Ulster parliament to be set up under the home rule act passed at the last session of Parliament. The prince, it was said, would also visit other districts in Ireland.

Belfast, March 28.—The fire main road from Newry to Dundalk, forming a part of the great highway between northern and southern Ireland, was blocked for eight miles today by the

falling of trees or the placing of landmines on it. Henry Kerr, sixty-five years old, a farmer of the Ballybay district of Monaghan, was taken from his bed by masked armed men Sunday morning and shot outside the local church.

TO FIX SILESIA BORDERS

Allied Envoy Soon Will Hold Meeting in Italy

Paris, March 28.—(By A. P.)—Representatives of the allied governments will meet in Italy soon to exchange views relative to the establishment of the frontier between Poland and Germany in Upper Silesia. It is said in dispatches to Paris newspapers from Rome.

It is declared that the question will demand an exchange of views between the various governments.

Thought They All Had Harems Constantinople, March 28.—(By A. P.)—Alarmed at the growing depopulation of Turkey, the Turkish Nationalist Parliament at Ankara is considering a bill to compel all men aged twenty-five or more to marry unless prevented by health reasons. Bachelors over that age will be very heavily taxed, while married men will enjoy privileges in taxation and military service.

NO FEAR OF "DRY" BRITAIN Lord Chancellor Calls Move Like That in U. S. "Inconceivable" London, March 28.—(By A. P.)—Alarm over the prospect of Great Britain going "dry" was deprecated by Baron Birkhead, lord chancellor, while speaking at the annual banquet of the Allied Brewery Traders' Association. He declared that members of the association did not, in his belief, have any cause for anxiety.

"As to the apprehension or chance of a general move such as has taken place in America," he said, "I am one of those who do not believe that it is even conceivable a similar change can take place in Great Britain."

"I should most profoundly regret it if any such change did take place because I am individualistic enough in my outlook, both upon private and public affairs, to resent profoundly attacks against the principles upon which is based the right of one individual to regulate his own private life."
