PAROLE BILL ADDS TO BROWN'S POWER

HARDING CONFERS WITH UNION HEADS

Leaders Summoned to Give Views on General Railway Situation

OTHERS TO BE CALLED

By the Associated Press. Washington, April 3.—R. M. Jewell, president of the railway department of the American Federation of Labor, and A. R. Hargrett, president of the Order of Railway Conductors, were called today to confer with President Harding.

It was understood that the two leaders were summoned to give their opinions not only regarding wage schedules, but also to the broader question of general railway rehabilitation.

They were given separate appointments, and it was indicated that other labor leaders and representatives of the railway managers would be asked to see the President later.

Chicago, April 3.—(By A. P.)—W. G. Boring, president of the Central Railroad of New Jersey, was the first witness called before the railroad labor board today in the hearing on rules and working conditions.

Previously to Mr. Boring's testimony a letter was read from E. E. Lowmyer, president of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America.

The board announced that Frank M. Manning, formerly assistant director of operations of the mechanical department of the United States railroad administration, would be called on Wednesday morning.

After going through the national agreements, rule by rule, Mr. Boring said that fifteen of the 184 rules of shop agreements were not clearly defined.

Pittsburgh, April 3.—(By A. P.)—Representatives of the shop crafts—employees of the Pennsylvania Railroad—were called before the national conference on proposed wage reductions.

The shopmen, who include machinists, steam fitters, electricians, blacksmiths, boilermakers, electrical workers and railway car men, were represented by a committee of Pennsylvania System.

New York, April 3.—(By A. P.)—Work and means for putting into effect a general wage reduction for all railroad employees were discussed here today at a conference between representatives of interests owning more than \$12,000,000 in railroad securities.

St. David's Wagon, president of the National Association of Owners of Railroad Securities, called the meeting, which was held before the meeting started that wage reduction was the principal issue to be considered.

GAS RATE BOOST OR LOAN, SAYS BODINE

U. G. I. Head Asserts \$16,000,000 Thermal Unit Equipment Can Check Cost

OFFERS FINANCIAL PLAN

A largely increased rate for the twenty-foot candlepower gas called for in the lease of the city-owned gas works, or the expenditure of about \$16,000,000 for new equipment to produce British thermal unit gas at a minimum cost, are the alternatives suggested by Samuel T. Bodine, president of the United Gas Improvement Co., in outlining a plan for the future development and operation of the gas works.

Mr. Bodine made his suggestion in answer to a request from the city gas commission which is to recommend a permanent policy concerning the supply in Philadelphia, Mr. Bodine's suggestions, it was said, were made regardless of whether the city would take over the gas plant in 1927 or lease the plant to an operating company.

The results to be accomplished were outlined by Mr. Bodine in this way: "The city's right to terminate the present or any arrangement at any time on pre-defined conditions. The company of the city's cash revenue and free gas service."
