

TURKS SEIZE HOME OF NICENE CREED

Isnik, Scene of First Ecumenic Council, Is Captured From Greeks

IMPORTANT BOOTY IS TAKEN

Angora, Asia Minor, April 8.—Ismik, a town thirty-two miles southwest of Usmid and near the Sea of Marmora, has been captured by Turkish Nationalists, Greeks defending the place fled, abandoning important supplies and prisoners.

The ancient name of Isnik was Nicaea. The first general ecumenical council met at Nicaea in 325 A. D., on which occasion the Nicene creed was framed. Rear Admiral Mark L. Belstol, commander of United States naval forces in Turkish waters, has taken up with the Turkish Nationalist Government the reinstatement of American teachers at the American College at Mersivian.

Kiazim Tara Bekir, commander of Turkish Nationalist forces at Erzurum, has arrived at Angora at the head of a cavalry division after a remarkable march from Armenia. He was summoned to the western front by the Turkish Nationalist Government after the Greeks launched their offensive east of Smyrna and Bursa.

The people of this city greeted Kiazim with the wildest enthusiasm. Flowers were strewn in the streets ahead of his horse. He continued his way to the front, declaring there was no fear of a Bolshevik advance in northeastern Asia.

Paris, April 8.—(By A. P.)—Turkish Nationalists have resumed their advance in the Bursa sector of Asia Minor, according to dispatches to the French foreign office. Four are entertained for the safety of the entire Greek expeditionary force. The magnitude of their reverse appears greater than was first supposed.

Athens, April 8.—(By A. P.)—Wounded Greek soldiers are arriving in such numbers from the Smyrna and Bursa fronts that sanitary authorities in this country are unable to care for them properly. Two thousand injured men arrived at Piraeus yesterday, and found inadequate hospital accommodations.

Queen Sophie has appealed to the American Red Cross in Paris for nurses. Many women of Athens are leaving to work in base hospitals in Anatolia.

To Sell Old Conshohocken Church

DELAY FOCH'S TRIP TO U. S.

Marshal, However, Hopes to Visit America in Near Future
Paris, April 8.—(By A. P.)—Marshal Foch has not as yet been advised of any invitation extended to him by the American Legion to visit the United States during the coming summer. He had intended, however, to visit America during the present month, but his plans were deranged by the necessity of conferring with the Supreme Allied Council. It is most difficult for the marshal to make plans in advance. During a holiday of a month in 1920 he was recalled from Brittany to Paris three times.

Marshal Foch hopes, however, to be able to find time for a visit to America in the near future.

SMALLER NAVIES URGED

Japanese Newspaper Commends Kato's Comment on Nippon Arms

Tokio, April 8.—(By A. P.)—Commenting on the recent statement by Vice Admiral Kato, minister of marine, in which he declared Japan was not trying to compete with the American Navy and that her project to have a fleet of eight battleships and eight battle cruisers not more than eight years old was not necessarily irrevocable, the conservative newspaper, Jiji Shimpo declares this statement merits serious attention throughout the world.

It deserves such attention, it says, because, contrary to the opinion of many other Japanese, it admits the possibility of scaling down the eight battleship-eight battle cruiser project when a reliable agreement for curtailment shall have been concluded among the Powers.

"Vice Admiral Kato's declaration," adds the newspaper, "should serve to remove misunderstandings abroad and give a decided impetus to the movement for international armament restriction."

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DELICIOUS and REFRESHING

ANASTASIA MAY HIRE SHIP

Likely to Come to U. S.—Husband May Not Be Welcomed in England
Athens, April 8.—(By A. P.)—Princess Anastasia, who is convalescing from her recent illness, may go to America soon, and will take a special steamship to New York, if it can be obtained. It was originally intended that she would journey to England for the purpose of undergoing a second operation, but in view of the fact that Great Britain has not recognized Constantine, it was feared that the princess' husband, Prince Christopher, might possibly not be altogether welcome. Princess Anastasia has refused to consider making the trip alone, and is said to be unwilling to leave her husband. Her recovery is being retarded by attacks of nausea.

TO DISCUSS MANDATE ISSUE

London, April 8.—(By A. P.)—Consideration of the British mandate over Mesopotamia will be begun at the next meeting of the Council of the League of Nations, which will be held in June. Premier Lloyd George so informed Sir J. D. Rees, member of the House of Commons, who inquired regarding the subject.
