Mrs. Thomas F. Meehan Is Elected Secretary of Philadelphia Organization

ANNUAL SMOKER TO BE HELD

A preliminary to the state convention of women's auxiliaries of American Legion Posts was the meeting held last week of representatives of the Philadelphia organization. The convention will be held in Philadelphia next June and Pennsylvania is said to be one of the strongest in the Union in its post auxiliaries.

At the meeting Mrs. Theodor W. Reith, 1528 Pine street, was elected temporary chairman of the auxiliary organization in Philadelphia and Mrs. Thomas F. Meehan, wife of Colonel Meehan, was elected secretary. It is the intention of the Philadelphia county auxiliary committee. Plans for the convention will be undertaken by the committee.

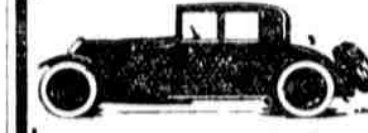

ASKS ONE MILLION TO FREE HUSBAND

Peggy Hopkins Gives Terms for Agreeing to Divorce From Lumber King

THREATENS BIG EXPOSURE

New York, April 13.—Peggy Hopkins Joyce is willing to give her husband, James Stanley Joyce, multi-millionaire lumber king, a divorce for \$1,000,000.

"The former 'Fallies' beauty says: 'If my husband appears in court, I will show what a creature he is. I only hope that I will not have to tell the truth about certain matters. He was always very jealous of me. He was always making a tremendous fuss.'"

In anticipation of her husband's suit in Chicago charging a conspiracy on the part of the ex-actress to wed him to gain a share of his millions and asking for an annulment of their marriage, Mrs. Joyce told a reporter that she had in her possession more than \$500,000 worth of jewelry.

She charged that her present hus-

band had exerted every effort to have her return the gems. She added: "I would rather throw them into the ocean than have my jewels reach his hands. I consider them my property."

She discussed the status of Henri Letellier, former owner of Le Journal, of Paris. The latter is appearing as a correspondent, according to advice from Chicago, where Joyce is now said to be putting up at an exclusive club. In this connection she declared: "You know that Letellier is the richest man in France. He is an editor and has owned one of the most successful of the French papers. He followed me all over Europe, but my husband had no reason to be jealous of him. My husband knew when he married me that I had many friends. But if he goes to trial with any contemplated suit tended to sever our marital ties there will be some developments that will make the evidence in recent trials rather mild."

Declaring she had never "wanted to marry Joyce," but that she finally consented to a wedding to stop being bothered, was one of the points made by the former actress.
