RAIL BOARD GIVES SIXTEEN PRINCIPLES

Chicago, April 15.—The sixteen principles as outlined by the railroad labor board in abolishing the national agreements, are as follows:
First, An obligation exists on management to give each employee a fair wage and opportunity for advancement.

and impose unreasonable conditions upon the carriers.
Tenth, Regularity of hours or days during which the employee is to serve should be observed in readiness to serve is desirable.
Eleventh, The principle of seniority, long applied to the railroad service, is equally applicable to other carriers. It should be applied as not to cause undue impairment of the service.
Twelfth, The board approves the principle of the eight-hour day, but believes it should be limited to work requiring virtually continuous application during eight hours. For eight hours, say eight hours, work should be performed by all railroad employees, except engine and train service employees, regulated by the Adams act, who are paid generally on a mileage basis as well as an amount of work performed.

Thirteenth, The health and safety of employees should be reasonably protected.
Fourteenth, The services and special crafts and classes of railroad employees have a substantial interest in the competency of apprentices or persons undergoing training. Opportunity to learn any craft or occupation should not be unduly restricted.
Fifteenth, The majority of any craft or class of employees shall have the right to determine what organization shall represent members of such craft or class. Such organization shall have the right to make an agreement, which shall apply to all employees in such craft or class. No such agreement shall be in force, however, until the right of employees to join the organization representing the majority is preserved. Employees either in person or by representatives of their own choice.
Sixteenth, Employees called or required to report for work, and reporting but not working, should be paid reasonable compensation therefor.
