

RECEPTION TONIGHT FOR NEW CARDINAL

Dougherty Will Be Officially Welcomed by Governor and Mayor

500,000 SHRIEK GREETING

All Philadelphia welcomed Cardinal Dougherty to his home archdiocese last night with an ovation which was unprecedented. The welcome will be continued tonight with ceremonies at the Academy of Music, in which executives of the city and state, as well as high church dignitaries, will participate.

Mayor Moore will officiate in the city and Governor Sproul will extend greetings of the state.

The welcome some time ago started many miles outside the city. In fact, almost as soon as the cardinal's special train rolled out of New York, and did not end until he arrived in front of the archiepiscopal residence at Eighteenth and Race streets.

At nearly every town and hamlet along the ninety miles of track from New York to Philadelphia bouquets burned and scores of institutions blazed a welcome from their windows. The special train carrying the distinguished prelate slowed its speed at many places, and he had the pleasure of hearing the cheers and music which mingled with the notes of welcome from scores of places along the line.

There were no sectarian lines in the tremendous greeting.

Three hundred or more Philadelphians of all creeds and walks of life went to New York on a special train yesterday afternoon to join the hundreds already there in the triumphal return.

They came back to Philadelphia in five special trains. The cardinal rode in a private car offered for his use by officials of the Pennsylvania Railroad. It was attached to the end of the second train to leave New York.

On the trip to Philadelphia two stops were made. The first was at Trenton, where Bishop Walsh, of the Trenton Diocese, was taken aboard the cardinal's private car. The other was at Frankford, where Mayor Moore joined the cardinal's party and welcomed him officially to the city of Philadelphia.

Throng Waiting at Station

An immense throng was gathered at North Philadelphia Station when the train bearing the Cardinal arrived at 7:55 o'clock. The city and railroad police had the station guarded closely. The streets adjoining were roped off. Only the welcoming party was allowed on the station platform.

As the Cardinal stepped from the rear platform of his car a half-dozen glaring white flares were set off by motion picture photographers. The Cardinal stood in the midst of the men who had gone there to welcome him. His brilliant red robes contrasted strangely with the somber hue of the formal garb of those gathered about him.

The Cardinal wore a red cassock. Over this was a rochetta, or surplice of red. Then there was the mantella, or small cloak, about his shoulders. Upon his breast rested the pastoral cross, the insignia of his office as Archbishop.

Cardinal Cloak Is Worn

Over all these vestments was thrown the red cloak of a Cardinal. On his head he wore a small red skull cap and

the red state ceremonial hat—'cardinal.' Then these stepped through the lines two little girls dressed in white. They bore a huge bunch of American Beauty roses for the Cardinal. They were Mary and Margaret Fitzpatrick, daughters of L. Fitzpatrick, their uncle, the Rev. Fenion Fitzpatrick, accompanied Cardinal Dougherty to Rome.

On the plaza at the station entrance, 150 automobiles had been assembled. The Cardinal rode in the last car, the private machine of E. T. Staebly. With the prelate rode Mayor Moore, Monsignor Nevin P. Fisher, Senior Vicar General of the Archdiocese and his administrator during the Cardinal's absence, and Mr. Steadley.

Protestant Churches Lighted

A striking feature in Broad street was the tribute paid to the returning Papal Prince by denominations other than his own. Three churches were illuminated in honor of his return. They were the Bethlehem Presbyterian Church, Broad and Diamond streets; the Baptist Temple and the Universalist Church of the Messiah, in Broad street.

In front of the Ancient Order of Hibernian headquarters were lined several hundred members. In the front ranks were members of the order's Red Cross branch. The women were in the Red Cross uniform. The Moose club

house was illuminated for the occasion, as was the new site for the Philadelphia headquarters of the Knights of Columbus, nearby.

Three hundred children were massed on the steps of St. Rita's Church, Broad and Federal streets, where the congregation is made up mostly of Italian.

The children sang as the Cardinal passed. There was red fire and Roman candles to add to the display.

Next Tuesday, the Cardinal will be the celebrant at Pontifical High Mass at the Cathedral. The Knights of Columbus will give a banquet in his honor at the Bellevue-Stratford, April 25.

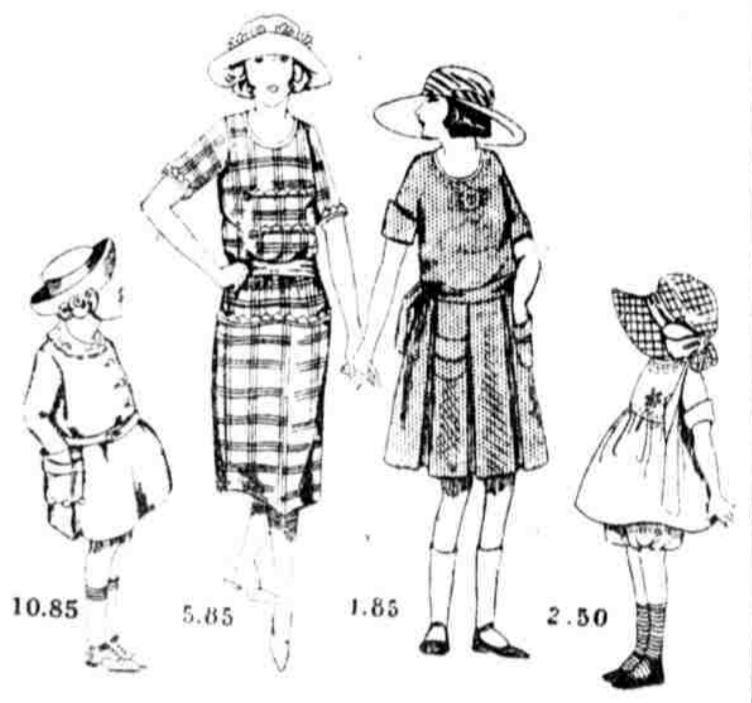
