

STREETS FLOODED BY BURSTING MAIN

Germantown Avenue Trolley Barely Escapes Nine-Foot Cave-In

MANY WITHOUT WATER

At the bursting of a main at Second street and Germantown avenue early this morning several hundred families of that neighborhood were deprived of water and passengers in a northbound trolley car narrowly escaped serious injury.

The main broke shortly after 3 o'clock and sent forth spurts of water which quickly flooded the streets for a block. Work was sent to the water break and all water in the section was turned off. The break caused a cave in across the tracks and traffic was held up for more than two hours. The motorman of the car who was approaching managed to stop it in the nick of time. The break caused a hole about nine by five feet. Workmen set to repair by damage inserted piles under the break and these are temporarily supporting the surrounding surface. It is believed that the damage will be repaired later today.

This is the third decoration of the Legion of Honor Mr. Wanamaker has received. He was appointed Chevalier of the Legion of Honor in March, 1907, and promoted to officer in December, 1907. The promotion to the high rank of commander is given to Mr. Wanamaker in recognition of his services to France during the war and in appreciation of his well-known attachment for that country.
