# REPORT OF MAYOR'S Description of Suspect PROBERS ASSAILED

Standardization of City Employes Not Advanced, Bureau Sets Forth

DEALS WITH SALARIES

The report of the Mayor's special committee, recommending certain salary pereases, was criticized today by the Unreau of Municipal Research as not indivancing the cause of standardization and classification of salaries and jobs.

"Why not stop dabbling with the problem of municipal salary and wage adjustment," the bureau asked in its weekly bulletin. "especially when there is a plan ready for adoption for dealing twenty-four shirts from a Market street store. 
