

If you want the children to take the subjects in which you are attempting to instruct them, seriously, you must make them live and keep in tourn with the times," said Mr. Nusbaum.
"For instance, if you asked your young pupil, today the question: "If a farmer sold a customer twelve and a half dozen eggs at twelve cents a dozen, how much did the customer pay for them? you would be likely to have the pupil snift. Or if a house may be rented for \$60 a month, or purchased for \$800 at 6 per cent interest, with taxes and repairs at \$260 a year, which is cheaper, to rent or 40 buy?

MAN KILLS WOMAN,

COMMITS SUICIDE

Mrs. Anna Blizzard, of Bridgeton, N. J., was shot and fatally wounded by Charles Bowers, fifty-three years old, when she refused to admit him to her house. Bowers then killed himself.

Mrs. Blizzard, who was fifty years old, died about 6 o'clock last night in the Breigeton Hospital. The shooting occurred Thursday, while Mrs. Blizgard's husband was in jail serving a ninety-day sentence for disorderly con

Police say Bowers owned a home sev-bral blocks distant from the Blizzard home. He persuaden Mrs. Blizzard to clean his house several times, and then. when Blizzard was sent to init, tried to force his attentions on the wife. Thursday Bowers went to the

woman's home and demanded admis-sion. When he was ordered to go away police say he drew a revolver and fired, the bullet striking Mrs. Blizzard in the

She ran into the house while her father-in-law. Alonzo Blizzard, sev-enty years old, ran out and found Bowers sitting on the step. After a scuffle the younger man walked to the street.
A few ininutes later he returned and

eaught a glinpse of Mrs. Blizzard through a window. He fired again, wounding her in the neck. Bowers then sent a bullet between his eyes. Blizzard was released from jail after the shooting and was at his wife's bedside when she died, as were their two
