

SHORE POLICE HOLD MURDER SUSPECT

Friend of Count Von Pickler Arrested With Two Women ALL GIVEN "THIRD DEGREE"

Atlantic City, April 23.—James Donovan, a former employe at the St. Charles hotel, was arrested late yesterday on suspicion in connection with the murder of Count Heinrich von Pickler, whose body was found ten days ago on the outskirts of the city.

The arrest followed an all-night and all-day grueling of two women and two men by Prosecutor Gaskill, of Atlantic County, who is in charge of the case, and his detectives. Each person was questioned separately in different rooms, and then followed a comparison of notes. It is said that Donovan was friendly with one of the women quizzed.

Donovan worked for several years at the St. Charles, where Count von Pickler was also employed under the assumed name of Henry Buehler, with which he hid his real identity during the twenty-six years in this country. Donovan is a friend of the dead man and is known to have accompanied him on tours of the northside retreats.

Further than to admit that Donovan was taken into custody in connection with the murder case Prosecutor Gaskill would say nothing. It is known that the county officials in his cell in the City Jail, but the prosecutor refuses to state whether he had thrown any light on the crime. No definite charge has been lodged against him, his ticket being headquarters merely stating "investigation." He is held, however, without bail.

Donovan left the St. Charles about

five weeks ago. Officials express the belief he was acquainted with the fact that Von Pickler carried large sums of money about his person. It was no secret at the hotel, as he was referred to as the man who always could change big bills. With the arrest, it is hinted, other developments may be expected at any time.

New Angle to Mystery The mystery was given a new angle in the information that Von Pickler never accepted mail at the hotel and it was always returned without being claimed. Most of his letters were sent to another address. Detectives believe that fact important in connection with clues tending to show that he had enemies abroad and wished to conceal his whereabouts.

George F. Maish came forward yesterday and told detectives that friends repeatedly remarked on the fact that Buehler, as he knew him, constantly seemed brooding when alone. He seemed in deep thought when noticed by himself and his attention could not be attracted when in such moods unless one spoke loudly or shouted. Maish worked with Buehler, when he first came to this country, at the Glen Summit Hotel, Glen Summit, Pa.
