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

The city plans to spend many millions of dollars for additional subway-elevated lines.

The city wants P.R.T. to operate these lines when completed.

City bonds used to build subway-elevated lines need not be charged against the city's borrowing capacity if P.R.T. pays as rental to the city a sum equal to the interest and sinking fund.

All economies reducing P.R.T. cost of operation will directly benefit the public by increasing the money left in the hands of P.R.T., which can be used to pay rental to the city.
