

GOLD FROM EUROPE SENT TO MINT HERE

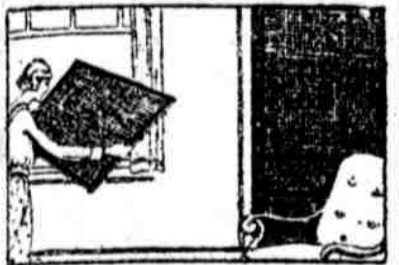
Over \$20,000,000 in Bars Received Since April 1—New York Diverts Shipments

More than \$20,000,000 in gold bars which were imported from Europe have been sent to the Philadelphia Mint since April 1. This action has been necessary because the government assay office in New York is filled to the limit with gold from all parts of the world.

York government officials have advised New York bankers to route their gold from Europe to Philadelphia direct. An executive of the Equitable Trust Co., New York, said yesterday his company was sending most of its gold to Philadelphia and that the results were satisfactory. "Our shipments are made by express," he said, "and are heavily guarded. We send a representative along. The gold goes immediately to the mint. We have a receipt of shipping a consignment of gold from our office here and of getting a telegraphic remittance from our representative who accompanied the gold for 90 per cent of its value, signed by the Philadelphia Mint, within three hours."

The Philadelphia Mint is a large one, has about 400 employees and is not in much danger, government officials say, of becoming clogged, as is the New York assay office. The capacity of the New York office is approximately \$15,000,000 a week. With the arrivals of gold at New York considerably above that amount and with no prospect of a let-up in gold shipments for a few weeks at least, the officials say that all that they can do is to refuse the overflow, let each shipment take its turn or advise shippers to rely on the mint here.
