

HOOVER URGES SEA STRIKE MEDIATION

Ship Owners Asked to Accept Union Proposal to Arbitrate Wage Demands

VESSELS BEING TIED UP

Washington, May 2.—White House officials today urged an arrangement of a federal commission to mediate in the controversy between the ship owners and the seamen.

President Harding, in a statement placed the issue in the hands of the Secretary of State and Mr. Hoover.

Secretary Hoover said the government hoped to find some solution for the marine labor difficulties.

Meaning the 15 per cent wage cut ordered Saturday by a National Board of the shipping board.

As the wage war went on Sunday, it was explained that it probably would be late today.

New York, May 2.—By A. P. The marine strike called yesterday to combine a 15 per cent wage cut with all other American flag ships.

Thomas Milligan, assistant general secretary of the Marine Union, announced that his organization already had tied up the British ship to enforce the mandate that foreign ships must meet the union scale of their crew.

At headquarters of the various unions, officials declared their own were observing the strike order to the letter.

30,000 OUT IN CLEVELAND

To Seek Separate Agreements—Employers Say They Will Stand as Unit

Cleveland, May 2.—By A. P. Twenty-five thousand and 30,000 men employed in more than twenty plants affiliated with the Building Trades Council left their jobs this morning.

The men's demand for a continuation of the wage scale for the year ending November 1st was not met by the employers.

Labor leaders in the building trades say they will continue in their efforts to obtain separate agreements with employers and will return to work separately as the agreements are reached.

At a special meeting yesterday to consider the forty-four-hour week, Williamstown, Pa., printers decided to continue work pending further instructions from the international union.

Chambersburg, Pa., May 2.—As a result of the refusal by employers to grant the demand for a forty-four-hour week on a forty-eight-hour pay basis, the printers of four establishments here struck here today.

Albany, N. Y., May 2.—By A. P. With approximately 20,000 union workmen in the printing, building and other trades in northern and eastern New York state today the result of a strike were closed.

Harrisburg, May 2.—By A. P. The state printer reported that his office was running and that he expected to have no more work.

Chicago, May 2.—By A. P. An advance by employers in many of the larger plants of the forty-four-hour week is being reported today.

Local officials of the International Typographical Union were authorized to issue a statement regarding the strike.

In several cities strike notes also were being taken up by pressmen and other unions.

New York, May 2.—By A. P. The forty-four-hour week has been granted in the book and job printing plants in New York city.

No trouble is expected in the printing industry because of the long work week, officials of the long said, but they pointed out that the question of wage cuts still remains pending.

7 IRISH DIE IN ENCOUNTERS WITH POLICE AND SOLDIERS

One Victim Son of Sinn Fein Member of British Parliament

Cork, May 2.—(By A. P.)—Seven persons were killed Sunday by the police and military forces in clashes in counties Cork and Tipperary.

In an ambush of crown forces in Kildorrery, County Cork, two Irish republicans were killed and five others captured, two of them wounded.

A police patrol which was fired on from a house in Tipperary returned the fire, killing two men.

One man was shot dead when crown forces surprised a band of men destroying a culvert near Lismore, County Cork.

Two men were shot dead when they tried to escape from a farmhouse near Limerick Junction, County Tipperary, during an exchange of shots with police approaching the building.
