

### FEDERAL CONTROL OF PRIMARY SEEN

Amendment Regulating Choice of National Candidates May Result From Newberry Case

### JOHNSON TO LEAD FIGHT

By CLINTON W. GILBERT Staff Correspondent Evening Public Ledger Washington, May 3.—A movement to amend the United States constitution will probably come as a result of the Supreme Court's decision in the Newberry case.

Senator Hiram Johnson, of California, the chief advocate of the amendment, will introduce such an amendment, if reading of the various opinions in the case leads him to believe that an amendment is necessary.

At present no text of the amendment is available, but it is understood by those who have heard the justice deliver their views, a majority of the court is thought to have held that Congress is without authority to regulate primary elections.

Senator Johnson's amendment is regarded upon two grounds. First, that the trial judge, in his opinion, and second, that Congress had no authority to pass the law limiting the number of members of primary elections.

On the first point the court was unanimous. On the second it is understood to have voted 5-4. The justice interpreting the constitution strictly will regard the control of elections by the federal legislature.

The reason for this latter view appears to have been that other primaries were not in existence when the constitution was adopted, they could not have been contemplated in conferring authority upon Congress.

The decision is of importance chiefly as it bears upon presidential elections. Either the direct primary as it applies to the selection of candidates for the presidency must be abolished or it must be regulated by Congress.

In the last two presidential nomination campaigns, the direct primary have been a scandal. The different states hold their presidential primaries at different times extending over a period of two months.

The scandal grew so great in the last nomination campaign that a special committee of the Senate, of which Senator Kenyon was chairman, investigated the campaigns of the various candidates for the presidential nomination of both parties.

The full text of his letter follows: "I am in receipt of a letter from Chairman Warren, of the Senate committee on appropriations, calling my attention to the fact that estimates now before the Congress call for approximately \$216,000,000 of deficiency appropriations and that the estimated deficiencies will run very much beyond that sum."

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Not All Warranted: In his letter to the President Senator Warren gave the total of deficiency estimates now actually before Congress as \$215,801,288.

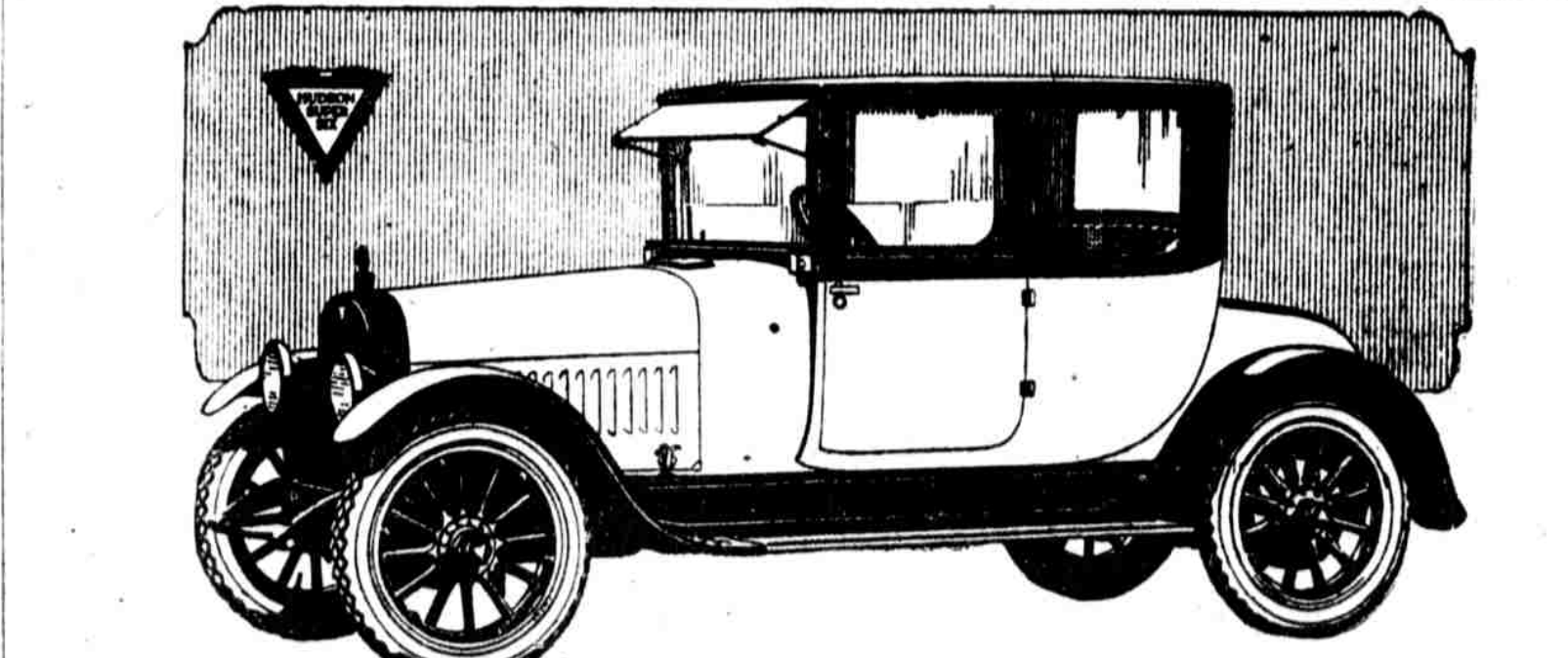
