GIBBONS PUTS OUT MAGUIRE IN SIXTH

Mike Stops Up-Stater With Left to Body After Administering Lacing

CALLS KNOCKOUT BLOW

A big crowd stayed away from the National Club last night and the few hundred of the dyed-in-the-wool who were there saw Frankie Maguire put a terrific end to his suffering a terrific performance for five rounds, when Mike Gibbons connected with a shot left hook to the body, fifty seconds after the bell started the sixth session. "A knock-out to the liver," said Gibbons, as he talked to himself—the blow landed and Maguire went down.

Referee McCracken started to count, but his arm and then beckoned to the fallen man's corner for his hand to enter the ring. The bout was over, and it's a cinch Maguire won't proceed with it, either. He was sore, all right, physically, for Gibbons had administered a vicious flogging to the Philadelphia Pa. entry.

Despite the fact that Gibbons was several pounds over weight, not being at all his real boxing weight, he handled Maguire as if he were a human punching bag—all of which Frankie was. Mike jabbed, hooked, uppercut and crossed the u-stater at will, leaving Maguire in bad shape almost from the outset.

Gibbons Staggered
During the fifth round there were number of cries from the slim crowd "Stop it!" With the exception of the Mike Maguire failed to make any impression whatever, other than the act of his gameness. In the second round, while Gibbons was backing up with Maguire tending in the center of the ring, a series of lefts and rights, right-hander clipping Mike on the jaw. The St. Paul Phantom turned back, his knees sagged and he fell into clinch, saving himself from going down.

From then on it was only a matter of how long Maguire would be able to withstand the bombardment of Gibbons' blows. In the half clinches Gibbons punished Maguire with powerful rights and lefts to the body, alternating with a series of lefts and rights, a brilliant exhibition, showed some of his old-time skill that won for him the sobriquets of "Phantom" and "Blitz" and proved conclusively that he had some good fights still left in his thirty-four-year-old self.

Martin Killelin, manager of Middleweight Champion Johnny Wilson, was a ringside spectator. He refused to admit himself when asked whether a Gibbons-Wilson contest was in the making.

"Yes," answered Gibbons in his boxing room. "I do want to meet Wilson or else I never would have been back into the ring. A chance to box for the middleweight title is the real reason for my boxing again, and I'll take this tip. I'll bring that crown back to St. Paul just as sure as guns."

Maguire tipped the beam at 157 and Gibbons was two and a half pounds over weight.

Jimmy Sullivan, 142, had Mike Creed, 145, in bad shape several times and won easily in eight rounds. Early in the contest Creed started Sullivan's nose bleeding with straight lefts, but the New Yorker was out in front throughout.

Tony Langhrim, 159, scored a victory over Johnny Alex, 153, and Kid Wagner, 127, displayed impressive form in defeating Gus Franchetti, 133. Wagner has been coming along at a fast clip this season. He is clever, uncles hard and is game.
