

3 HURT IN CRASH ON OLD YORK ROAD

Two Women and Man Violently
Thrown From Motorcar.
Autos Are Wrecked

OTHER TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS

Three persons were injured late last night in a collision between two automobiles at Old York road and Meeting House road.

The cars were going in opposite directions, and met with great force. Both machines were badly damaged in the smashup.

Those injured are Louis Berg and Viola Berg, 9740 North Eleventh street, and Miss Margaret O'Neil 6702 North Eleventh street. All were taken to the Abington Hospital.

Berg and Miss O'Neil received severe cuts and bruises of the head and body. Viola Berg suffered bodily injuries and a possible fracture of the skull.

They were thrown to the roadside by the impact. Dr. Edwin B. Miller, 2331 Cumberland street, who was passing, took the injured to the hospital in his automobile.

A boy is in the Abington Memorial Hospital not expected to recover, a Philadelphia woman was painfully injured at Atlantic City and a five-year-old girl was hurt in other automobile accidents since Saturday.

The injury to the boy, Roland Roberts, seven years old, occurred late Saturday night in front of his parents' home in McKinley. The boy, with several companions, attempted to run across the street and was struck by a car driven by Samuel H. Morrell, 2431 South Front street.

Emil Roberts, the boy's father, witnessed the accident and attempted to

attack Morrell, but was restrained. Later when Morrell was before Magistrate Williams in Abington, the father again became excited and attempted to strike Morrell, who was released in bonds to await the outcome of the boy's injuries.

Losses Portion of Ear

Mrs. D. B. Shepp, whose husband is in business at 921 Chestnut street, was painfully injured while riding on Absecon boulevard on the outskirts of Atlantic City. The auto in which she was riding ran into the rear of a car owned and driven by Frank Laboscio, of Atlantic City. The shock threw Mrs. Shepp through the windshield and a piece of flying glass cut off a portion of her ear, taking with it a diamond earring.

Mrs. Shepp was treated in Atlantic City and later sent to her home in Frankfortville. Others in the cars were not injured.

While crossing the street in Oakmont, Ruth Gledhill, five years old, of 40 Hillcrest street, was knocked down by a car driven by L. B. Campbell, of Bryn Mawr. The child's injuries were not serious and Campbell was not arrested.

H. M. Satter, of Noble, driver of the automobile which struck that occupied by the Bergs, was arrested by the Cheltenham police. He will have a hearing this morning before Justice of the Peace Hollerman.



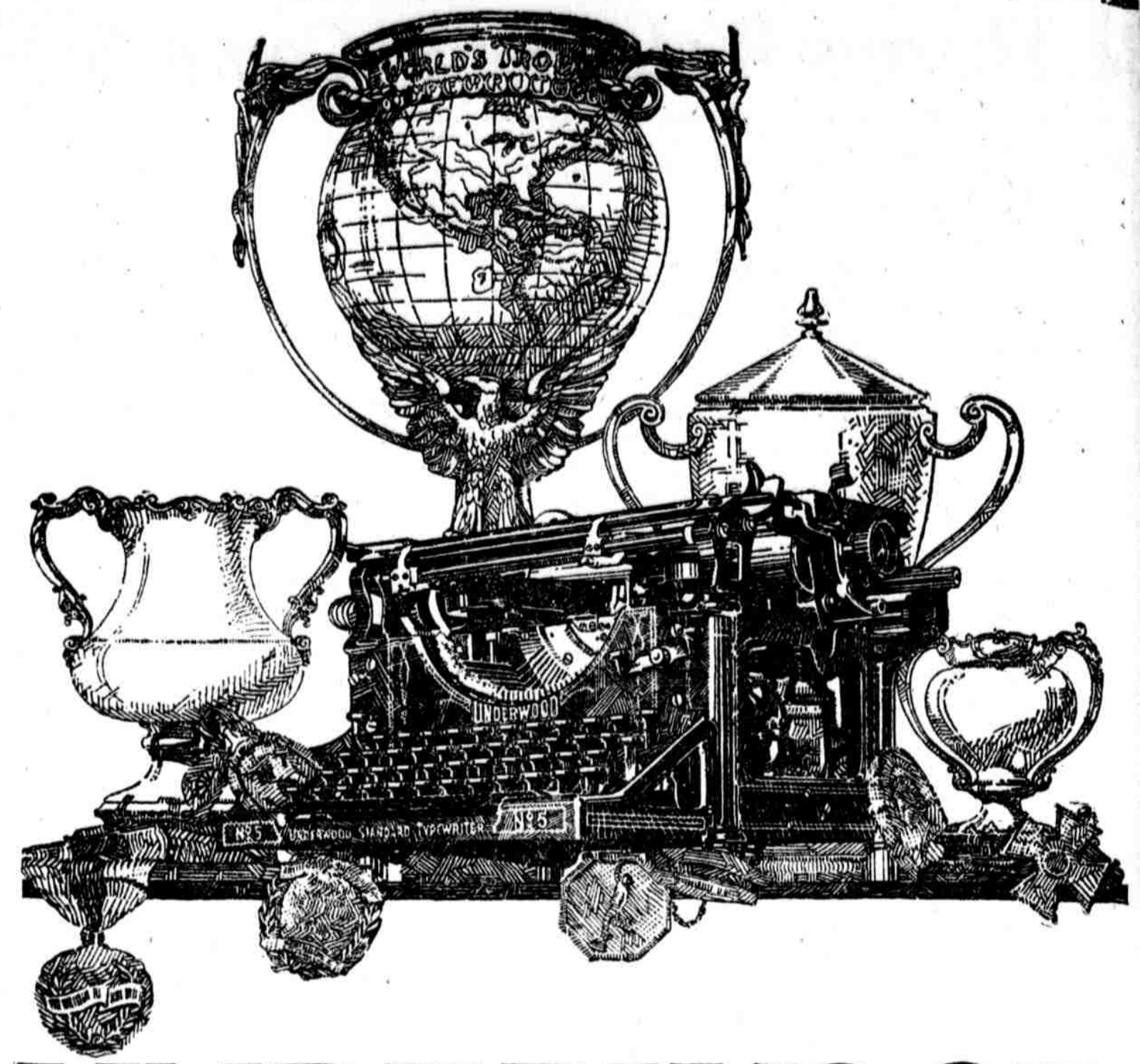
