Foch, Diaz, Beatty and Others to Be Asked to Attend Convention

NEWS OF POST DOINGS

Prominent officers who directed the work of the Allied armies and navies during the war are to receive official invitations in the near future from the American Legion to be their guests at the Legion convention at Kansas City next October.

Marshal Foch, General Diaz, commander of the Italian Army in the defeat of the Austrians; Admiral David Beatty, and a distinguished Belgian soldier will be asked to attend the convention. National Commander W. W. Galbraith has designated Thomas W. Miller, of Wilmington, Del., Alien Property Custodian, to present an invitation, through the British Embassy, to Admiral Beatty. With other representatives, he will forward the invitations through diplomatic channels to the other distinguished guests.

DAUGHTER BRINGING BODIES OF COL. AND MRS. PIERCE

Mrs. Dewitt Jones Sailing Tomorrow From Antwerp—Will Arrive May 30

With the bodies of her parents, Colonel and Mrs. Charles C. Pierce, both of whom died in France recently, Mrs. Dewitt Clinton Jones will sail on an army transport tomorrow from Antwerp en route to this country.

Mrs. Jones' homecoming will mark the end of a fateful journey, which began when she left her home in St. Louis and sailed for Neully to reach the bedside of her dying mother. She reached the hospital April 21 just a day before Mrs. Pierce died. After the funeral in Paris she remained to nurse her father, who was stricken with influenza at Tours, his illness being superinduced, friends say, by grief over his wife's death. Colonel Pierce died May 16.

Upon the arrival of the bodies at Hoboken, they will immediately be shipped

to Arlington Cemetery at Washington and buried with appropriate ceremonies. It is expected that they will arrive here about Memorial Day.

Colonel and Mrs. Pierce were well known in this city. The former was rector of St. Matthew's P. E. Church, Eighteenth street and Girard avenue, for a long period. Colonel Pierce had been a chaplain in the army for more than thirty years and was called from the retired list by General Pershing to serve as chief of the Graves' Registration Service.
