

MADONNA IS VICTOR IN BRILLIANT RACE
 Italian Champion Beats Out Wiley by 100 Yards in 30-Mile Grind
 REPORTS NEAR THE FINISH

sprint in the last two miles carried him through a winner by 100 yards over George Wiley. The latter had been leading for about eighteen miles and it was not until the last mile that the Italian champion breezed through ahead. Madonna's time was 40 minutes 51 4-5 seconds.
 Madonna began leading after the third mile of the race, overtaking Willie Coburn, of St. Louis, who got out in front at the crack of starter Jack Rosen's pistol, when the Missourian lost his pace. The Italian flyer kept the lead until the eleventh mile, when he was forced to change bikes because of a punctured rear tire.
 It was then that Wiley pedaled into first place and the Syracuse entry stayed out in front until he was passed by Madonna on the twenty-ninth mile. With but two miles to go and still a lap behind, having regained three laps, Madonna, paced by Johnny Schlee, let out a terrific burst of speed. He challenged Wiley and after a hard race passed the American. Madonna was clocked in 1

minute and 4 seconds for the twenty-ninth mile.
 Wiley, paced by Eddie Root, finished second; Percy Lawrence, of San Francisco, behind Norman Anderson, came in third, and Willie Coburn, following Jimmy Hunter, was fourth.
 Lawrence finished in such fine fashion that he was substituted for Coburn to ride tomorrow night in a four-cornered thirty-five-mile race against Madonna, Menus Bedell and Frank Corry.
 The first one-mile professional sprint match race of the season was won by Orlando Piani, Italian champion, in two straight heats over Freddy Taylor, of America. The times were 1 minute

and 44 seconds, Piani winning by half a wheel, and 2 minutes and 54 seconds, with Taylor trailing by three-quarters of a length.
 Tom Watson, representing the Quaker City C. C., with the maximum handicap of 185 yards, was the winner in the final heat of the two-thirds-mile amateur race. His time was 1 minute 19 seconds. Jake Smith, of Olympic C. C.; George Gergely, S. E. Wheelmen, and Frank Harris, Olympic C. C., were others to finish in order.
 The two-mile open amateur race was won by Frank Harris, with George Patterson, second; George Gergely, third, and Tony Giacomo, fourth. The time was 5 minutes 29 2-5 seconds.

PICKEREL SEASON OPENS
 Anglers May Catch 12-inch Specimens Beginning Today
 Here's more good news for anglers. The pickerel fishing season opens today in New Jersey, and it is legal to catch pickerel of twelve inches and over between daylight and 9 o'clock P. M.
 Indications point to good fishing for pickerel this season. For the last month anglers out for perch and catfish in these same ponds have found pickerel more than fairly numerous. In some instances more of these fish were caught and returned to the water than yellow perch.
