Morshead, of the Survey of India, with two assistant surveyors, left Darjeeling on May 13 and proceeded with fifty coolies up Teests Valley to correct some data of Sikkim Mahi which are very inaccurate. Major Morshead will join the main party at Khamba Dzong on June 1.

A. F. Wollaston, with many interesting expeditions to his credit, is bot-anist and zoologist of the expedition and is responsible for its health. Dr. Heron, of the Indian Geological Sur who is in charge of the geologica work, has been lent by the departmen to try to solve geological problems swaiting the explorer on the northern slopes of the Himalayas.

The principal transport of the expedition consists of 100 mules lent by

Lord Rawlinson, commander in chief in India, who takes great interest in the expedition. Each mule can carry a load of 160 pounds. Mules are by the best and quickest transports. on in the mountains wherever paths the practicable. The mules were spe-cially picked at M crut, Amritsar and Sialkot, and are all Chinese and Tibetmules, accestomed to the rigors of Tibetan climate.

The drivers accompanying them are all hillmen from the Chamba Kangra Valley and other hill districts in Northern India. They have been doing longute marches every day to get fit and training for the hard work they will ave to undergo on the Sikkim and libetan routes.

IN PRISON HOSPITAL

Riga, May 27.—The health of Dr. Estes, the American motion-picture photographer who is being held prisoner by the Boishevists, has improved greatly since his recent remoral from a prison cell to a hospital in Moscow, advices from that city reveal.

During his imprisonment Dr. Estes was examined twenty-three times, according to word from him which has reached here, and was three times told he would be shot, with the day and hour fixed. He is still in good spirits, however.
