

Elimination Round Tomorrow to Oust One of Five Suburban League Division Winners

Two teams will be drawn today from the winners of the five divisions in the men's Suburban League golf team competition. These two clubs will play off on home and home courses tomorrow to enter the semi-final round.

Printing the results has been an abbreviated process in the public prints during the competition, due to the whirlwind of golf going on in all climes. The best statistics available, however, figure the winners of the divisions from incomplete summaries as follows: Division A, North Hills; Division B, Cresona; Division C, Cedarbrook; Division D, Woodbury; Division E, Aronimink. One of these five teams will be eliminated tomorrow and the other four clubs will battle it out next Wednesday to enter the final round.

North Hills won the championship last year, but this year is minus such stars as the two Platts and Eddie Styles. The other four teams are strong this year, with Cedarbrook and Aronimink standing out. The latter team, predicted to win at the start of the competition, still looks very good. In Tewksbury and Reynolds it has the two best lead-off players in the league, Wright, Rainier, Satterthwait and the rest of the men are respected golfers.

But Cedarbrook also has plenty of talent. As if to prove it, Edward J. Tallant is captain of the team. So strong is that J. J. Boodle, Atlantic City finalist, and Miles Higgins are the lead-off players. LaRoche, F. J. Higgins, Reckner, Johnson, Hanson, Jennings and Sober have all shown a steady brand of golf in what play there has been this season. The team qualified for the interclub championship, second in fact, which should recommend it to the new club for serious consideration.

Several Tumbles
Surprises started early in the play. Frankford only won three out of ten matches against Haddon County E. V. O'Hanlon, Frankford, beat William Flinn, but the other Haddon County star, Vinnell, surprised everybody by beating Morris Jones.

In fact, Fox, Tonell and Rowman were all beaten away, and Frankford finished the league meeting somewhat disorganized.

North Hills won all their matches in this league comfortably. Lanerch got the necessary jump in Division B opening day by beating Lansdowne. The latter won only one match at home and two away. It had a fairly easy time with the other two teams later, but it was too late.

Cedarbrook had earnest competition in Philmont, Roxborough and Old York Road. Bob Hoffman led Philmont and Zimmer Platt headed Roxborough, which made the leading matches as good as tournament tussles.

Woodbury proved strong in D as expected. The Jersey team has several young players who carried the team to the title in other years, but Woodbury will have to step to head the list this season.

In winning Division E, Aronimink displayed real prowess, though it nearly slipped a fatal jolt at the hands of Merchantville, "dark horse" at the start. Opening day the Drexel Hill team only won from the Jerseyites by three-quarters of a point. Tewksbury didn't play in that match, so it was only the good work of the Aronimink men at home that carried the day.


