Wallace F. Johnson, champion of Philadelphia and one of America's first ten lawn tennis players, has been named captain of the Quaker City team which will meet the winner of the New York and Boston racquet experts at Merion on Saturday afternoon.

These intercity contests were conceived by George Myers Church, once captain of the Princeton team and a player of vast possibilities. The trophy s awarded each year to the team winning the best five of nine matches and is perpetual. Church, who lived in New Jersey, saw and believed, correctly, that lawn tennis in the East was centered in New York, Boston and Philadelphia. With this idea in mind he donated a cup that would be given to the best team in these three cities in a triple competitive match early every

season.

The Church Cup matches are four years old this season. The first year they were staged on the Merion Cricket (lub's turf courts, at Haverford, and New York won. In 1919 the matches were played in Boston and the beancravers captured the trophy. Last year philadelphia played Boston in the pre-liminaries and lost five. Then the metropolitan artists proceeded to wipe up the turf with the New Englanders. Play Starts Friday

For the second time the Merion Cricket Club will have the Church Cup event. The preliminaries or semi-finals will be played Friday afternoon at Haverford, and on Saturday Wallace Johnson will have his young men out to go against the winning combination.


