The program will open with music by the Philadelphia Police Band, to be followed by calisthenics and traffic sig-nals. First-aid drills will be given. showing artificial respiration by the Schaefer method as used in resuscitating persons overcome by smoke or gas.

Demonstrations also will be given of how classes are instructed by the medical staff of the Police Bureau in applying first aid in cases of hemorrhages of the leg, fracture of thigh, fracture of lower leg, fracture of lower arm, the fire carry and the method of removing a person from contact with a live wire. Humane methods of handling prison-ers also will be demonstrated, together with class work in juju. Station house rollcall will follow, after which there will be United States infantry




