

48 POLICEMEN END TRAINING COURSE

Mayor Will Make Address to Recruits at Graduating Exercises Tonight

DRILLS TO BE GIVEN

Forty-eight probationary patrolmen will be graduated at the exercises of the Police Training School at the Second Regiment Armory, Broad street and Susquehanna avenue, at 8:30 o'clock this evening.

Mayor Moore and Director of Public Safety Corleau will address the graduates and dancing will follow the exercises.

The program will open with music by the Philadelphia Police Band, to be followed by calisthenics and traffic signals. First-aid drills will be given. Schaefer method as used in resuscitating persons overcome by smoke or gas.

Demonstrations also will be given of how classes are instructed by the medical staff of the Police Bureau in applying first aid in cases of hemorrhages of the leg, fracture of thigh, fracture of lower leg, fracture of lower arm, the fire carry and the method of removing a person from contact with a live wire.

Humane methods of handling prisoners also will be demonstrated, together with class work in the station house roll call will follow, after which there will be United States infantry drill.

Lieutenant John Stuckert supervised the instruction of the probationers. Dr. Hubley R. Owen, chief police surgeon, is first-aid instructor; Sergeant Harry Edwards, drill instructor; Sergeant B. Frank Rodman, physical instructor; Patrolman George T. Deegan, assistant physical instructor, and Patrolman Herman Thomas, firearm instructor.
