"The periodic reprimand of Rear Admiral Sims has achieved the virtues of mathematical precision. About every so often that officer says something with a vigor and frankness that surprises the Navy Department, when it does not openly shock it or, as now, when it reduces the Secretary of the Navy to a confessed amazement.

"No language can be strong enough in the condemnation of those who, during the war, sympathized with Germany and did what they could to mate-rially aid the enemy. If Mr. Denby was looking for an opportunity to be amazed he might very well have transferred his emotions to the ignoble incident of the World War that found British subjects in secret alliance with the Germans. The comment of Rear Admiral Sims upon these miserable traitors deserves applause."


