

### HUMAN DEPRAVITY THEORY ASSAILED

New Head of Northwestern University Finds Social Sciences Lagging

### MEN NOT TRAINED RIGHT

Evanston, Ill., June 14.—The typical American of today is a city dweller, Walter Dill Scott, president of Northwestern University, told the students, alumni and visitors attending his inauguration as president of the university here today.

"We are no longer justified in assigning human depravity as the cause of inefficiency and discontent in homes, schools, churches and industries," Dr. Scott added.

"The real cause is rather to be found in us, who are parents, teachers, ministers and managers. We have failed to develop methods of handling children, pupils, parishioners and workers in keeping with the developments of the twentieth century."

"The social sciences have not been as completely developed as the natural sciences and as helpfully applied and, consequently, we have not made a sim-

ilar advance in methods of training and handling men. Men and women are today not adequately trained for twentieth century civilization and they are not working together effectively and happily.

"The typical American of today is more often the descendant of steeplechase passengers than of the Pilgrim Fathers. Our convention of men, our methods of training men and our methods of handling men are all largely the traditions of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries.

"The traditional methods of handling men in America was to divide them into two classes—the bosses and the grudees, and to treat them accordingly. Most Americans were thought to be bosses.

"Our inherited methods of training and handling of men fail to meet our present needs. For guidance we must understand the crowd and the mob. We must think in groups, classes and races. We must realize that in America today convention is more potent than tradition."

### LINK NOTED WOMAN IN STILLMAN CASE

Banker's Wife Promises Sensation by Naming Suspect at Hearing Tomorrow

### BOMBHELL TO FINANCIER

New York, June 14.—Mrs. Anne Uqhart Stillman yesterday instructed her counsel to explode the biggest bomb in her aggressive defensive campaign at Poughkeepsie tomorrow.

When the hearings are resumed she will name as one of the three co-respondents a woman in high society. This woman is as well known in the homes of the millionaires on Fifth ave-

nue as she is at Miami, Atlantic City, Newport and the resorts in Europe. This move in the case is made public for the first time and marks the opening of the smashing campaign for the defense decided upon in the last few days by John F. Brennan, field marshal of Mrs. Stillman's legal defenders.

Mrs. Stillman went to Poughkeepsie last night to direct her lawyers at the hearing. She motored to the scene of the legal battle.

The society woman will be placed side by side with the other two co-respondents—counsel decided yesterday there shall be only three named—Mrs. Florence Lawlor Leeds and the woman known as "Clara." The society woman will appear in the amended answer as filed with Referee Daniel J. Gleason tomorrow morning as "Helen," the name being fictitious.

Her associate co-respondents are actresses, while she has been a queen in many social centers. Her real name will be disclosed before the hearing has gone along very far tomorrow. Numerous families with high social connections are hopeful that Mrs. Stillman will relent and exclude the woman's name from the list. She will not, her counsel said, listen to the importunities of those who would shield the woman.

### LOAD HONOR ON MME. CURIE

Scientist Will Get Honorary Degree and Medal Tonight

Chicago, June 14.—(By A. P.)—Madame Marie Curie, co-discoverer of radium, who, with her two daughters, is spending three days in Chicago, is guest of the University of Chicago today.

In addition to receiving an honorary degree this evening she will be the honor guest at a banquet given by the Chicago section of the American Chemical Society, which will present to her the Willard Gibbs chemical research medal. Mrs. Curie will be the eleventh person to receive this medal and the first woman recipient.

Tomorrow Mme. Curie will receive an honorary degree at Northwestern University. She leaves for Buffalo, N. Y., tomorrow evening.

### LEAVES \$2,000,000 IN ART

Famous Paintings Comprise Bulk of Woman's Estate

Chicago, June 14.—(By A. P.)—A collection of paintings valued at nearly \$2,000,000 forms the bulk of the estate of Mrs. Evaline M. Kimball, eighty-year-old widow of William M. Kimball, piano manufacturer, who died here yesterday. The collection, which they spent years in assembling, includes Rembrandt's "Portrait of Artist's Father," painted in the year 1630 and said to have cost \$110,000; Corot's "Landscape With Bathing Women," for which \$17,500 was paid; John Constable's "Stoke by Meyland," \$45,000; Sir Joshua Reynolds' "Lady Sarah Bunbury," \$32,500; John Francois Millet's "Sheep With Peasant Girl," \$20,000. There also are paintings by Gains-

borough, Romney and Sir Thomas Lawrence. It is thought these art treasures may

be taken to the Chicago Art Institute. A brother, Irving H. Coe, of Los Angeles, is the only surviving relative.

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
