WOMEN CLASH IN SEMI-FINALS TODAY

Miss Thayer vs. Mrs. Newhall and Miss Gardner vs. Miss Cottman at Wilmington

DOUBLES ARE STARTED

Wilmington, Del., June 22.—The best singles matches of the women's tournament for the championship of Delaware will be played this afternoon at 2 o'clock when Miss Polly D. Thayer, Philadelphia Cricket Club, meets Mrs. Newhall, Germantown Cricket Club, in the lower bracket of the semi-finals round and Miss Eleanor Cottman, the Baltimore girl, clashes with Miss Kathryn Gardner, Westside Tennis Club, in the upper half.

If all of the games in triplets form Miss Thayer and Miss Cottman should have the right to clinch the final round for the right to an enlarged foursome, then Miss Marion Zinderstein Jessup, however, after Miss Phyllis Walsh's defeat by Miss Peggy Ferguson, predicting results is a hazardous pastime.

The only fourth-round match that was really a contest was that which Miss W. H. Newhall, triumphed over Virginia Carpenter, the brilliant young player from the Philadelphia Club. Carpenter had things going all her way in the first set and won it at 6-3. Mrs. Newhall did not seem to be able to strike her stroke at all in the opening set, and this combined with Miss Carpenter's good play was too much of a handicap for the German tennis player. In the last two sets, however, Mrs. Newhall found herself, and carefully placing her shots had Miss Carpenter running all over the court to make the returns. Mrs. Newhall took the final two sets, 6-3, 6-2.

Mr. Jessup Wins

Mrs. Marion Zinderstein Jessup, Wilmington, made her first appearance in the tournament when she and her partner, Mrs. E. H. Godfrey, gave Miss Louise Dixon and Mrs. Krumm a facie, 6-4, 6-1. Mrs. Jessup played beautiful tennis, not yielding and serving being the trademark of the amateur woman. Mrs. Jessup has the tournament last year and will defend in the singles this season, but her partner, Miss Edith Sigmund, is in England with the American invaders, so that Mrs. Jessup had to find another partner in an effort to win both titles again.

Johnson Beat Self In Losing His Title To Big Jess Willard

LYNCH KNOCKS OUT SANDOW

Some people think Jess Willard defeated Jack Johnson because he was the better fighter. Others feel sure that Johnson was beaten by his own method of living and by the irresistible show-up process that time imposes on even man after he passes the crest of physical perfection. And there are those who believe Artie Williams was not anxious to beat Willard in any case.

Whatever the case, the star of Jack Johnson's ring career flicked out at Hayes on April 5, 1913. That day, for the second time in his life, Johnson was knocked out. The first enforced nap had not been long. It was taken at Galveston in 1901 at the hands of Joe Gans, and Johnson was almost unconscious when he awoke from this second slumber, he said, his hair to the jaw.

Willard was twenty-seven years old, ten years the junior of the champion, and both his height and reach exceeded those of Johnson. The dusky titleholder apparently put forth his best effort in the early rounds, but he could not stand the giant to the canvas. Willard was won in his movement, fighting on the defense and with great care, manifestly hiding his claws.

His time kept him fighting quite a while. Johnson was a little fatigued, a little slower and some of the outward signs were gone from his arms, but his ring generalship, his mastery of tactics and his foreseen manhood was still the most clever of them all.

The early rounds showed him to be the more tenacious scrapper he had always been. Why don't you come ahead and fight?—so frequently uttered at the cautious Willard.

Later the signs of log weariness were apparent in Johnson's movements. In the eighteenth round he suddenly seemed to become exhausted, while the Kansas was still fresh and glistening.

Plainly tired and worn out, Johnson kept up the fight for seven more rounds. In the twentieth round he glanced at his wife with a look of distress and despair that warned those near the ring of his impending fall.

As soon as he met Willard the now boy's right arm shot out and struck Johnson flush on the chin. He sank down and a new champion was proclaimed.
