"Every friend of international peace and progress, therefore, must withhold final judgment until Mr. Healing sees fit to disclose the detailed plans of his association. But this is clear: If he wants the permanent support of most of the American people, his association must be more than a mere group of nations, agreeing to be good and peace, able and all revolving about a court."


