The record book recites with monotonous regularity his list of knockouts: Homer Smith, one round; Jim Flynn, one round; Bill Brennan, six rounds; Bull Sadles, one round; Tom Riley, one round; Dan Ketcher, two rounds; Arthur Pelkey, one round; Kid McCarthy, one round; Bob Devere, one round; Porky Flynn, one round; Fred Fulton, one round; Jack Moran, one round; Carl Morris, one round, with others of more or less note meeting the same fate.
