

MADONNA VICTOR IN EXCITING HEAT

Despite Puncture, Italian Beats Chapman in 20 Miles, Deciding Match Race

PIANI WINS FROM RUTT

Vincenzo Maddona evened his score with George Chapman in motor-race competition by winning in straight heats at the Point Breeze Velodrome last night. Two weeks ago the Italian champion was defeated by the Philadelphian in two out of three heats at Providence, R. I.

The deciding heat of last night's event was a twenty-mile race in which Maddona showed his remarkable ability as a speedster, his gameness and sensational sprinting ability. After going into the lead at the start of the second heat Maddona was handicapped by a punctured rear tire, and he was forced to change bikes. In doing so Vincenzo took almost three laps.

It took Maddona five miles before he was able to get well under way again and on the thirteenth mile he set out on a terrific sprint. The 3400 yards who braved the threatening weather stood up en masse and cheered lustily for the first living Italian. On the next mile he cut down Chapman's lead by a lap.

Maddona Loses Pace

Continuing his brilliant spur Maddona again circled the American champion on the fifteenth mile, and as they came speeding into the seventeenth mile the foreigner passed Chapman by two lengths. But Maddona's lead was only temporary, as he lost pace and George again went out in front.

With but a mile to go, just as nine-tenths had been negotiated, Maddona put on another spur and, whizzing by Chapman, the Italian pedaled into the lead, finishing a winner after covering the final six laps in 1 minute 20.2-5 seconds.

Madonna's ten-mile heat was clocked at 13:42. He went into the lead at the outset and never was headed. On the last mile, Chapman's front tire punctured and Vincenzo finished without any competition.

Orlando Piani, the Italian sprint champion, won in straight heats from Walter Rutt, titleholder of Germany, in their one-mile race. The respective times were 2:41.2-5 and 2:53.3-5. Each time Piani finished in front by half a wheel.

Harris Is Victor

The one-mile amateur open was captured by Frank Harris and the half-mile amateur handicap was won by Lee Elbertson, who was given 135 yards. Harris is the Olympic C. C. crack, while Elbertson carries the colors of the South End Wheelmen.

Forty-mile international team match race, to be decided in two ten-mile and one twenty-mile heats, has been arranged for tomorrow night. Participants are Jules Miquel, respectively Belgian and French champions, will ride against Manus Redal and Percy Lawrence, the American stars.

A match sprint between Willie Spencer, who has become a naturalized American citizen, and Bill Bailey, English champion, also is on the program, in addition to two amateur events.

Scraps About Scrapper

GEORGES SMALLEST OF ANY CONTENDER

Measurements of Carpenter Undersized Compared With Other Title Heavyweights

WILLARD BIGGEST MITTMAN

Physical measurements of Georges Carpenter, challenger of the world's heavyweight crown, will be smaller in several days than any boxer who ever appeared in a titular tilt when the Frenchman faces Jack Dempsey at Jersey City July 2. Tommy Burns, who was defeated by Jack Johnson, was shorter, but he was heavier than the foreigner and more compactly built, while Bob Fitzsimmons was about the same weight, 172, as Georges probably will weigh, when Robby Rob was defeated at Coney Island by Jim Jeffries.

There are only two measurements in Carpenter's make-up which are bigger than those of Dempsey, the Frenchman's calf is bigger than the titleholder's, 15 1/2 inches, compared to 15 1/4, and his neck measures 16 1/2 inches, a quarter of an inch more than Dempsey's.

A difference of about twenty pounds will be in Dempsey's favor, and Jack is taller by an inch and a half, standing 6 feet 1 inch. The Frenchman's reach is an inch shorter than the champ's, the latter's being seventy-four. Carp and Jacques are almost evenly developed in wrist and ankle, only a fraction of an inch favoring Dempsey in each case.

Carpenter's biceps are a quarter of an inch bigger than those of Dempsey's, which measure 16 1/2. Both have won

desirable back developments, but Carpenter's muscles appear to be more magnificent, and from those the Frenchman's hitting powers will be drawn.

Jack Willard, whom Dempsey knocked out in three rounds, was the largest champion. In several other respects the more compact Jim Jeffries outstripped Willard easily. Willard, for his size, was not developed as highly in a physical way as several others who have held the title.

Willard scaled 240 pounds and was 6 feet 6 inches tall. His reach of 83 1/2 inches was far greater than that of other titleholders. His chest measurement of 39 inches, normal, was seven inches less than that of Jeff. Jeffries' wrist, neck, biceps and ankle development was greater than that of Willard, and Willard's calf measurements were only a fraction of an inch larger than Jeffries'.
