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**AUDITOR REFUSES OBERHOLTZER PAY**

Lewis Says Salary of Film Censorship Director is Not Provided For

**MAY MEAN LOSS OF JOB**

Harrisburg, June 24.—Dr. Ellis Paxson Oberholtzer will probably lose the job of director for the Board of Motion Picture Censors to which he was appointed last October by Governor Shroul at a salary of \$3000, following the failure of the Governor to reappoint him a member of the Board of Motion Picture Censors.

Auditor General Lewis has refused to approve the salary for the office of director because the Legislature refused to make the job statutory. Since Dr. Oberholtzer's salary for the Board of Censors he has been the storm center of a flood of criticism against the Governor.

**Lewis States Position**

In a letter to Harry L. Knapp, chairman of the Censor Board, Auditor General Lewis explained his refusal to approve Dr. Oberholtzer's salary for the first two weeks of June as follows:

"Previous to May 31, 1921, Mr. Oberholtzer was paid out of the 1919 contingent fund appropriated to your department. The next session of the Legislature passed an act, approved by the Governor on May 25, 1921, amending Sections 11 and 13 of the Act of May 15, 1915, P. L. 334, thereby reorganizing and rearranging your department in the matter of employees and salaries.

**Not Unforeseen Item**

"And, furthermore, the Attorney General, in his opinions, has said the contingent fund was intended to meet unforeseen and unexpected contingencies that may arise in a department. This expenditure for Mr. Oberholtzer cannot possibly be said to be an unforeseen and unexpected contingency, since he was paid by you this same salary for this same service for a considerable period before the passage of the 1921 amendments, referred to above.

**SEA DOGS RUSH FOR JOBS**

Twelve U. S. Vessels at Hog Island to Be Pressed into Service

See those crowds at Eighth and Chestnut streets and on Fourth street across from the Bourse today? Wonder why?

Here's the answer. Word has gone forth that twelve United States Shipping Board vessels are to be taken from retirement at Hog Island and put into service again, and the recruiting offices of the board were swamped today with hundreds of merchant seamen applying for work.

Both 27 South Fourth street, the regular recruiting office, and 804 Chestnut street, the offices of the marine superintendent, had long lines of men patiently waiting all morning. Some of them were old sea dogs, others did not look as though they ever had been to sea before.

Some of the ships laid up have been at Hog Island six months. They will be allocated to various companies and put to work on various trade routes of the world. There will be sixty five ships left at Hog Island after the twelve sail.

**STILLMAN'S WIFE TO ASK DIVORCE**

Action is Based on Favorable Turn in Testimony Recently Taken

**WANTS ALL THE CHILDREN**

New York, June 24.—So favorable has been the testimony thus far for Mrs. Anne Urquhart Lettler Stillman in her husband's divorce suit that her attorneys are preparing again to amend her answer, this time abandoning the affirmative defense and substituting a request that she be granted a divorce from James A. Stillman.

It has been hinted several times since the suit was started nearly a year ago that if Mrs. Stillman's son she would follow this up with a counter-claim for divorce, but at no time was it suggested that both suits would be tried at the same time.

John F. Brennan, chief counsel for Mrs. Stillman, is said now to feel his client's interest would be served best by an amalgamation of the two suits. The decision to do this was reached during the last forty-eight hours. It is said, and was based on the favorable turn the suit took last week for Mrs. Stillman and Baby Guy. Lawyers who have been following the developments feel certain the allegations, so far as they affect Guy, have collapsed completely.

In respect to Mrs. Stillman, the witnesses placed on the witness stand by the banker's lawyers contradicted themselves so much that Mr. Stillman's representatives contend they cannot understand how Referee Gleason can render a decision in favor of Mr. Stillman.

Mrs. Stillman is known to be anxious personally to have the litigation cleared up all phases of the tangled domestic situation. She has told friends that she harbors only pity blended with contempt for Mrs. Florence Leeds and the other co-respondents in the case.

What she wishes most to see now is that James A. Stillman be permanently swept from her life, that the custody of all their children, Anne, Bud, Alexander and Guy, be awarded to her, and that the banker be required to pay a proper allowance for their support.

Mrs. Stillman is certain that the outcome of the present action will be the refusal of Stillman's petition for divorce, the fixing of Guy's status as a legitimate child and the setting of sufficient alimony for her and the children.
