

cipitate flight alone saved Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion pugilist, from taking the count here last night, his opponent in the fray being David Brown, a process server attached to the district court.

Brown, a diminutive individual, put the stalwart champion to flight in the second round of a bout which had its inception in the court.

Brown had waited several hours to see the champion and when Dempsey approached the entrance to the national stadium grounds, the court official walked up to the giant and proceeded to nesday. Dempsey looked dubiously at Brown, then smiled, simply said "fine" and then, turning quickly on his heel, listed in individual events. bolted for the gate. Championship Disappears Detroit, Mich., June 25 .- Whereabouts of the Harmsworth trophy, emblem of the world's powerboat pionship, which was won by Garfield A. Wood in English waters last year.
