

# 5000 PHILA. FANS TO SEE TITLE BOUT

### City's Delegation Will Include 500 Women, According to Estimates

## MANY SPECIAL TRAINS

Philadelphia's biggest delegation to any world's championship bout will go to Jersey City for the Dempsey-Carpentier scrap tomorrow.

According to the railroads, it is expected that 5000 "fans" will make the journey to see the "greatest bout of all time." And of these 5000, according to estimates, some 500 women will watch the American champion and the French contender battle for supremacy.

Some of the city's most prominent sons, in every line of activity, will be seen at the ringside. It will be a crowd truly representative of society, fashion, big business, the professions and plain "fandom."

Both the Reading and the Pennsylvania Railroads have made special arrangements to handle the tight crowds. Many persons will go by the regular New York trains. There will be special trains in addition, and the wealthy enthusiasts, who are taking big parties over, have arranged for more than forty private cars.

A number of social organizations have purchased blocks of seats for their members. Notable among these are the Raquet Club and the Locust Club. The Raquet Club sent 100 to the famous championship bout when Dempsey knocked the crown from Willard's brow, and will multiply that number on this occasion. It is estimated that about three-fourths of the membership of 850 will go to the big fight tomorrow.

The Union League is another organization which will send a strong delegation to the fight. A goodly proportion of the prominent men of the city will be in attendance, either alone or with their clubmates.

New York will be host to many of the fans tonight. Others, however, have arranged to go over tomorrow and will arrive just in comfortable time for the opening bell.
