

GRAND JURY BACKS MEMORIAL MOVE

June Panel Approves Petition Proposing Building Honoring Fighters in Late War

\$1,250,000 AVAILABLE

Erection of Philadelphia's war memorial received its first impetus yesterday by approval from the June Grand Jury of a petition asking official sanction of the work.

The plans of those behind the petition are to use the memorial for a convention hall. With that idea in view, the work could qualify for the appropriation of \$1,000,000 made by Council in 1917 for a convention hall and for the \$250,000 appropriation now in possession of the Park Commission to be used in the building of a soldiers' memorial.

The petition for a memorial hall, originated by the American Legion, is based on an act of the Legislature passed last March which authorizes the erection of memorial buildings in honor of war veterans. The law provides that when a petition signed by fifty citizens has been presented to the County Commissioners, it shall be laid before a special grand jury for their approval. The matter will then be put before the voters at a general election by the first approval was obtained from the retiring Grand Jury yesterday.

County Commissioners Holmes and Kuenel appeared before a jury to support the next jury will give the Commissioners the right to go ahead and submit the matter to the citizens. The act specifies that the Commissioners may require a desirable site by purchase, donation or condemnation under the right of eminent domain.

The petition with nearly 400 names was presented to the jury by I. G. Gordon Foster, James F. Ryan and William H. Du Barry, representing the American Legion.
