

MT. GREYNA CAMP READY FOR OPENING

Three Thousand Guardsmen to Begin Two Weeks' Training Tomorrow

U. S. OFFICERS TO INSTRUCT

Special Dispatch to Evening Public Ledger. Mt. Gretna, Pa., July 8.—Everything is in readiness for the opening of the annual encampment of the Pennsylvania National Guard, beginning here tomorrow and continuing until August 20.

The camp this year has been divided into three periods of two weeks each. The first troops to go under canvas will be those of the Fifty-sixth Infantry Regiment.

Advances Details Arrive. Advance details of the various organizations are all on hand, excepting those of the Fifty-sixth Infantry.

Twenty-four regular army officers and fifty non-coms arrived yesterday to act as instructors in the more specialized military instruction. These men are under the command of Captain Maurice Miller, U. S. A., executive officer for the regular army corps of instructors.

Division Headquarters Opened. Division headquarters on Reservoir Hill were officially opened at noon yesterday. The majority of the division officers, including Major General William G. Price, commanding officer, are not expected to arrive until Saturday noon.

The camp this year will be known as Camp Brigadier General Edward Sigerfoos, in memory of Brigadier General Edward Sigerfoos, U. S. A., who was killed while leading the Lafayette Pioneers (Forest d'Argonne) September 29, 1917, to take command of the Fifty-sixth Infantry Brigade, Twenty-eighth Division.

NEW JERSEY GUARD WILL OPEN CAMP

First Units Start Today From Camden for Training at Sea Girt

PLAN SPECIAL COURSES

Units of the New Jersey National Guard will open their encampment at Sea Girt tomorrow.

Three companies will leave the Camden terminal of the Pennsylvania Railroad at 9:30 o'clock in the morning, fully equipped for two weeks' training.

The Camden companies, units of the 114th Infantry, include the Service

Company, commanded by Captain Albert R. Howard, with eighty-eight men; Howitzer Company, in command of Captain Samuel H. Brown, with seventy-eight men, and the Headquarters Company, under Captain George L. Selby, forty-six men.

The Camden units will join the other companies of the 114th Infantry, forming the Third Regiment, for two weeks' intensive training at Camp Edwards, in Sea Girt.

The band of the 114th Infantry, recruited from Camden County, with a complement of forty-eight men, will accompany the Camden detachment tomorrow.

Other units of the 114th Infantry, leaving Saturday, are Company A, of New Brunswick; Company B, of Somerville; Companies C and D, of Elizabeth; Company E, Mount Holly; Company F, of Burlington; Company G, of Asbury Park; Company H, of Trenton; Company I, of Salem; Company K, of Millville; Company L, of Vineland, and Company M, of Bridgeton.

Colonel Winfield S. Price, of Camden, will command the regiment, and Brigadier General Borden, of Newark, will be commander of the camp. Edward B. Stone, of Burlington, is lieutenant colonel of the 114th, and the

regimental adjutant is George L. Selby, of Camden.

The Rev. Charles R. Dubell, of Camden, is chaplain of the regiment. In all 1200 men and officers, the peace-time strength of the regiment, will be trained.

The 113th Infantry, the old Sixth Regiment, of Northern New Jersey, will not go into camp until July 16, and will remain at Sea Girt until July 30.

This year's training calls for five hours' bayonet drill a week, and four

hours' weekly drill in musketry, six and one-half hours of athletics, twelve hours of preliminary target practice, and twenty-four hours' range practice. One hour a day will be devoted to school work.

One hour and a half will be devoted

to discipline and courtesy instruction, and two and one-quarter hours to physical drill.

A feature of the encampment this year will be the new position in handling arms, which will make for ease and more accuracy in marksmanship.

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
