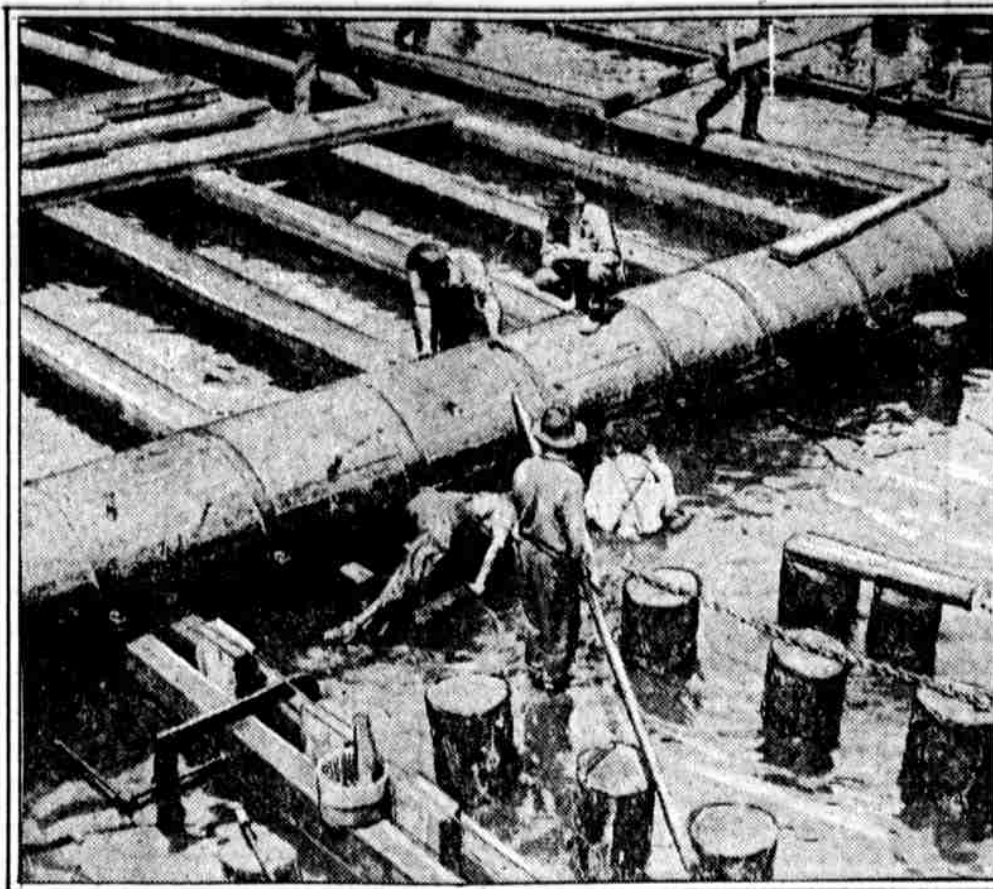


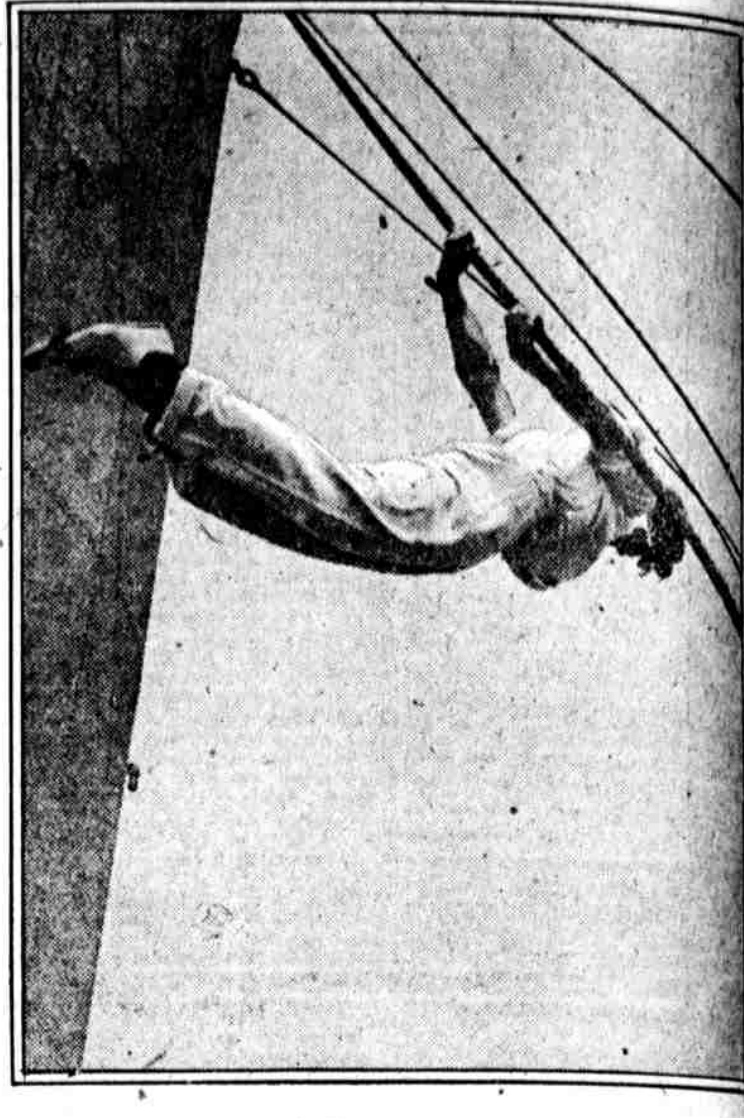
A VENDOR. The balloons of many colors that attracted prospective customers at an English seashore resort. Great target for a shot-gun.

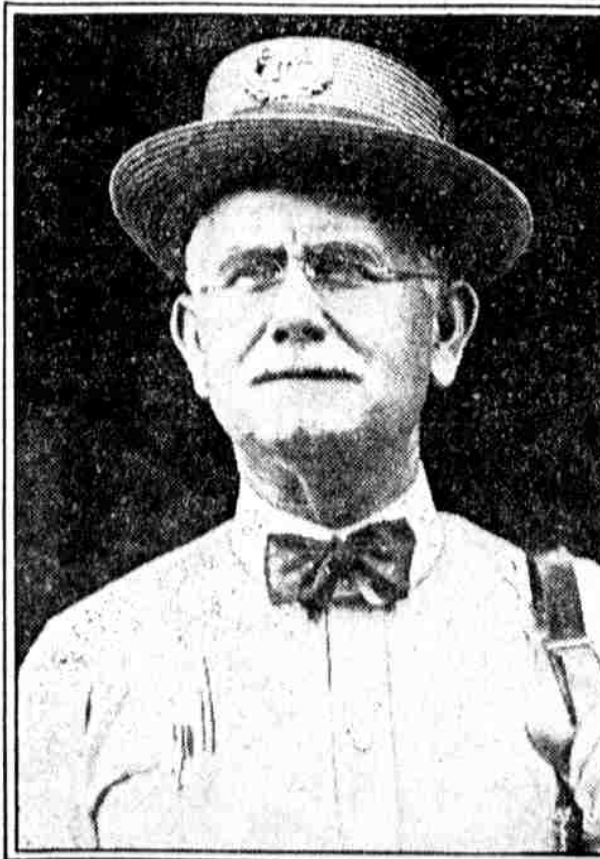
