

President Harding Will Present Winner of National Open with Cup

JIM BARNES IS HERO OF OPEN GOLF PLAY

Former Whitmarsh Pro Scintillates on First Day of Blue Ribbon Event—Abe Mitchell, British Invader, Withdraws—Hackney Plays Well.

Columbia Country Club, Chevy Chase, Md., July 22.—JIM BARNES is out in front of this straining pack on the third day of the open golf championship of the United States, picking along like a winged Mercury, four strokes up on all those hardy enough to stick it out. He followed his straight hit of a 60 yesterday morning, which tied his own record for the course, with the smoke-screen of a solid 75 in the afternoon. His total was 144. They used to say "Let Jim Barnes get going right and he'll never catch him."

On the other hand, there's the disconcerting fact that he generally has been round the round that the British invader presented him from winning the title which is the ambition of his life. "Too, he must face the added nerve strain of leading the field and holding it safe. The others are back and sneaking up. One slip, and all the advantage of a leader in play like this may be wiped out."

Champions have been crowned who have been ten, yes, thirteen strokes ahead the first day. There is still very much an open championship, and all the data must come a cropper ere Mitchell, anyhow, nobody can detract from the brilliance of "Long Jim" yesterday. From the time he laid into his first tee shot to the time he sank a six-foot putt on the thirty-six green, he played sound golf.

President Harding will present the cup to the winner the first time in the history of golf if a nation's chief has so long run in a similar tussle. It is said his speech is all prepared, and all he has to do is write in the winner's name. The cup has been polished up for the occasion, and a burly member of the military stands guard over it in the reception hall of the clubhouse to see that no one claims it before all the figures are in.

The cup is a grand trophy, a silver one, which quite overshadows the smaller pitcher emblematic of the British championship which Jock Hutchison brought with him. The first time an American ever brought this historic cup across the sea. The former pro at Whitmarsh carried the mob all day yesterday and it was a treat all the way. He turned out four 3's in a row and four birds out of six straight holes, returning in thirty-three strokes, the best back nine that has been done in the tourney. In the afternoon he started badly, being five over 4's for fourteen holes. But from his cautious position at the end of the plateau to the fifteenth he pitched beautifully to the green and provided down a ten-foot putt for a birdie 8 to the zipping of the throng. On the next he was nicely on to a bird 2, but couldn't get over the edge of the green. He all but holed a long putt on the seventeenth and the gallery moans, as galleries do when a ball hangs on the lip. An iron to the eighteenth slipped straight into the goal. Seldom does one see a sight such as Barnes holed to make his iron to the thirty-sixth green. Twilight cast its scarlet tinge over the great colonial club house sitting up there against a background of tall poplars. Packed there on the banks was a solid mass of humanity of all the white and gorgeous colors of a warm day. His second shot bounded wildly into

Diegel and Jack Burke, who tied for second place last year, trailed in the wake of ill-fortune. Diegel had the worst. After a proper 75 in the morning, he went blithely till he hit the fatal fifth. Here he smacked three tee shots out of bounds, and was still playing seven from the tee. His 11 there gave him an 83 where he should have been 70, and right with the first ten this morning, Burke took 166 strokes, and was doubtful whether it was worth while to finish it out.

Eight Strokes Apart
Eight strokes only separated the first thirteen. These were Barnes, 144; McLeod and Murray, 148; Bobby Jones, 149; Kerrigan, Alex. Smith, Duncan and Hackney, 150; Evans and Loeffler, 151; Hagen, French and Cruikshank, 152.

The Philadelphians, with the exception of Hackney, were charmingly inconspicuous, as stated yesterday. Tony Natalie and Frank Coltart were both over 165. Bill Leach took 83 in the afternoon for 162, tied with Bob Barnett. J. J. Rowe withdrew and left but six conferees in the running. George Sayers still had a chance, though a long one, with his total of 159. He had a 78 in the afternoon.

Navy Talks Football
Annapolis, Md., July 22.—There is much talk of football at the Naval Academy despite the hot weather. While the regulars of last year in their positions will again be available, every slice on the team is regarded as a better man can be found. It is declared that the Naval Academy has had such an array of high-grade backfield material as that which will be put at the disposal of Coach Powell when the season opens. Of the sixteen coaches in back of last season only two have gone and there is some additional good material in last season's second squad and in the new "blue" class.

Of His Game
Mitchell just shook his head sorrowfully, according to Eye-witness E.V. Murphy, a Philadelphia fan, present at the scene. So that was that. "I was off my game and need a rest," was all the mighty Mitchell would say. But the galleries could not help recalling how Walter Hagen, though he did not have around under 80, played through to the bitter end of the British tournament last year and bravely submitted his cards for the record as fifty-first from the top. George Sargent and George Bowden, former open champion of Massachusetts, were others to pick up. And there are several notables who are thought to be through so far as the money is concerned. There's Jock Hutchison, who had a ragged finish for an 88 in the afternoon. Joe Kirkwood, Australian champion, had an 81 with Jock in the afternoon, and in twelve strokes back of Barnes, his partner. "Aren't you going to play it out?"
