

G. O. P. COMMITTEE TO ACCEPT WOMEN

Meeting of City Organization Friday Expected to Give Them Right to Membership

ALSO ALL OFFICES IN BODY

Full recognition of the eligibility of women for membership and offices in the Republican City Committee will be accorded at a special meeting of the central body, Friday afternoon, at 2 o'clock. A call for the meeting was sent out today by Harry C. Davis, executive director.

preceded by a conference in the morning between a sub-committee of five of the City Committee and representative women headed by Mrs. B. Dobson Altemus, chairman of Committee of Philadelphia Republican Women, co-operating with Mrs. Barclay H. Warburton, vice chairman of the State Committee, and Mrs. A. R. Harmon, who is organizing another committee.

Women's First Primary

The City Committee, in the afternoon meeting, will discuss campaign plans, with special reference to the part to be played by the women. This is regarded by the leaders as particularly important, as it will be the first time women will participate in a primary election here. They received the vote too late last year for the primaries and were only qualified to vote in the general election.

Women Will be Named to Work with the Men's Campaign Committee

Women will be named to work with the Men's Campaign Committee and otherwise to co-operate on the same basis as the men. Pending the election of women to the ward committee and to the City Committee next year, plans are under way to have the women serve by appointment.

Talk of Woman Candidate

Further it is predicted that there will be an informal discussion of the suggestion in organization circles that a woman be slated for City Controller, one of the "Row" offices to be filled in the coming election.
