Work on America's Gift to Belgium Starts With Elaborate Ceremony

HARDING SENDS MESSAGE

Louvain, Belgium, July 28.-The cornertsone of the new library of the University of Louvain, planned as a gift of the American people to the people of Belgium, was laid with elaborate ceremony here today.

The reading of a message from President Harding was a feature of the exercises, which were attended by King Albert, who delivered an address preceding the laying of the stone, as did Cardinal Mercier, the Primate of Bel-gium; former President Poincare, of France, and Premier Carton de Wiart,

of Pelgium.

The building to be erected will replace the world-famous library of Louvain, destroyed by the German army in its invasion of Belgium in 1914.

The representatives of leading Amer-The representatives of leading American and other universities participated in the ceremonies. Dr. Nicholas Murnay Buther, president of Columbia University, New York, laid the cornersione as chairman of the American emmittee for the restoration of the famous educational center. Cardinal Merc er. Primate of Belgium, standing in the midst of Belgium's highest clergy, blessed the building. As the corner-tone swung into place, Dr. But-


