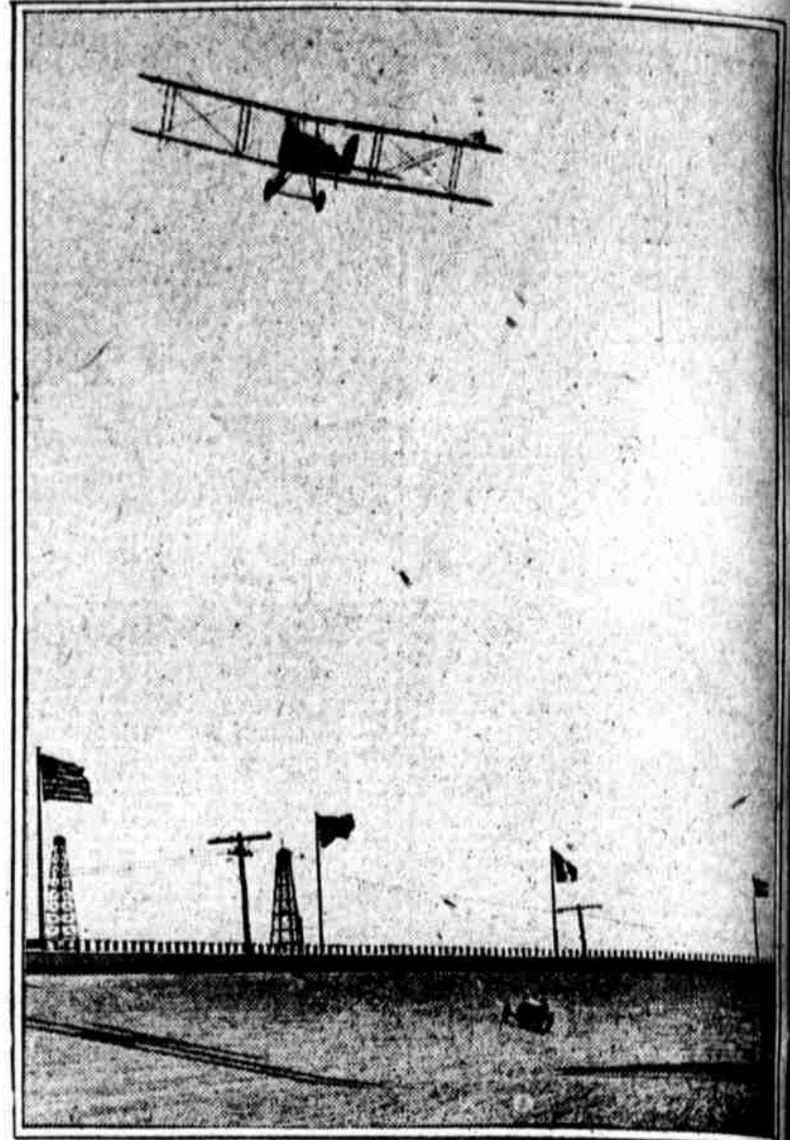

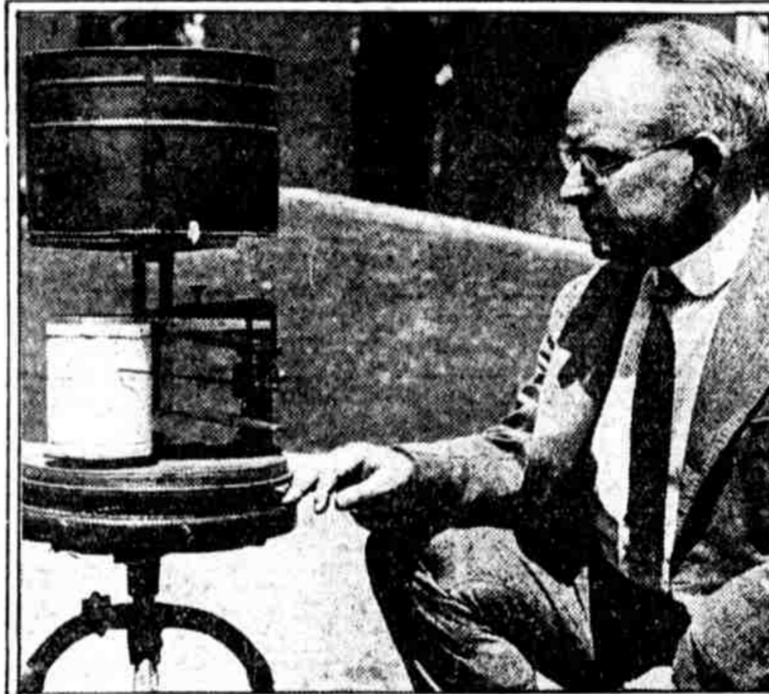
AIRPLANE BEATS AUTOMOBILE. This spectacular race took place at Los Angeles. The craft of the air went 118 miles an hour to gain the victory.

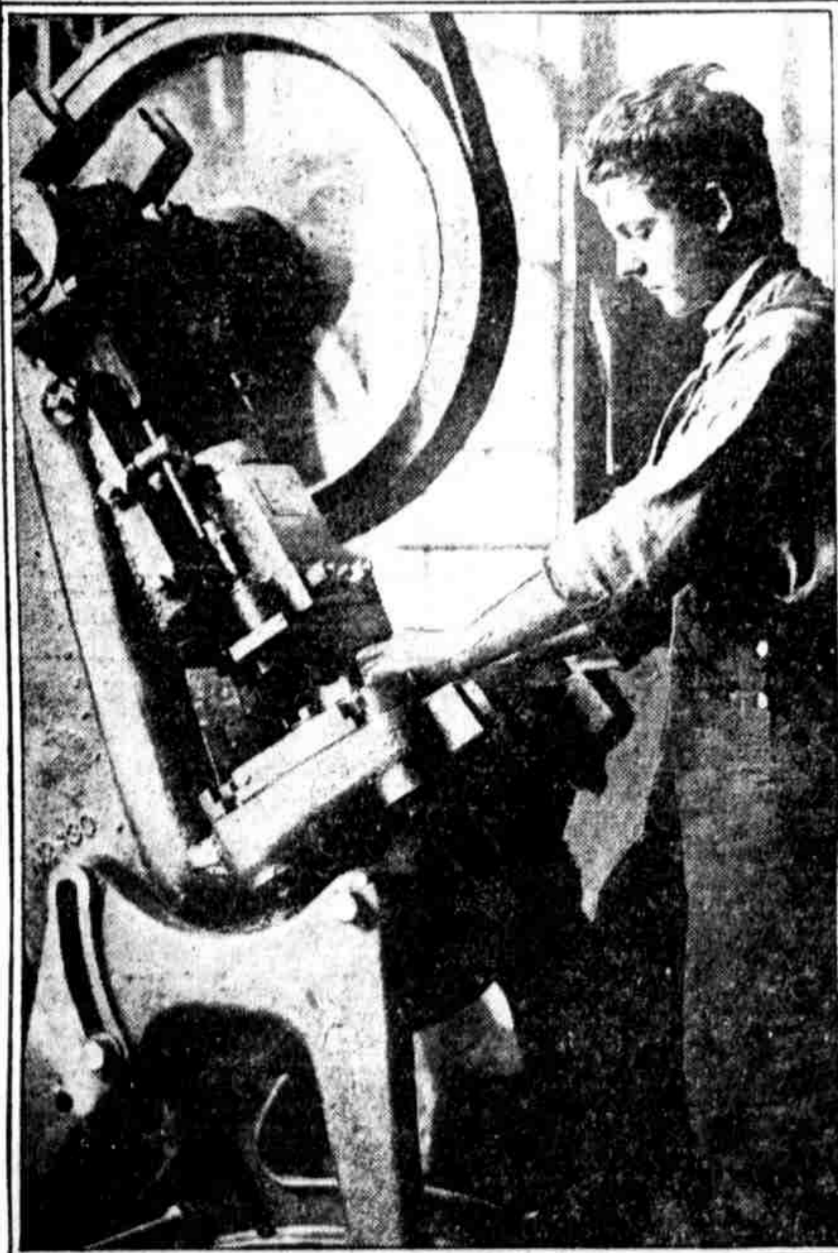

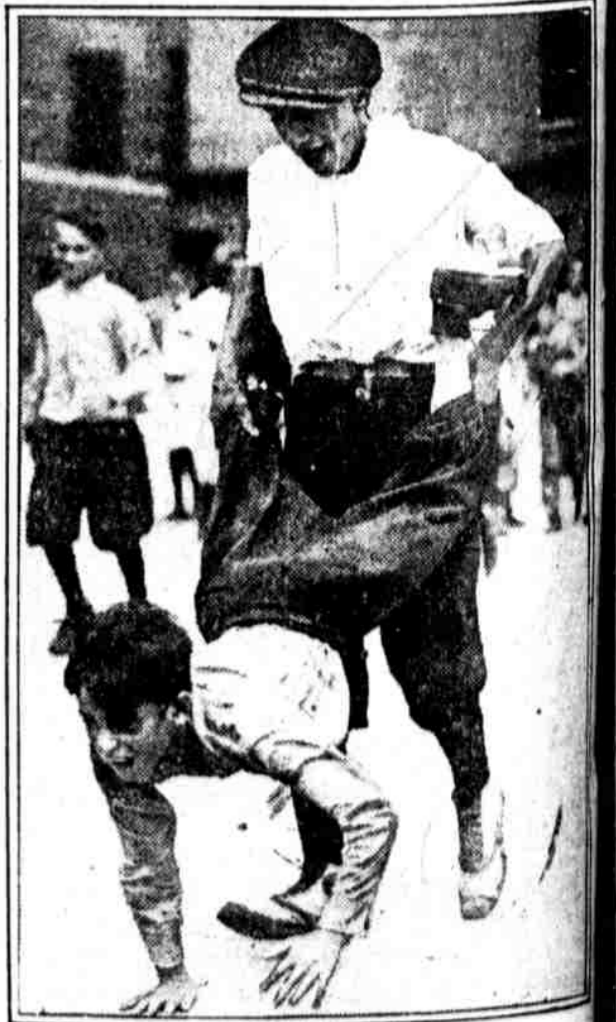
