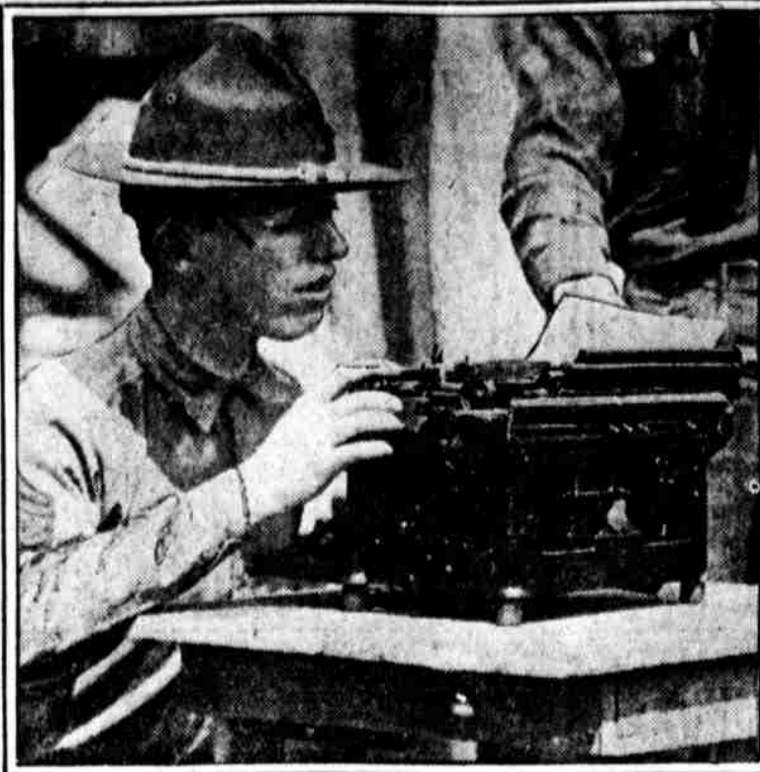




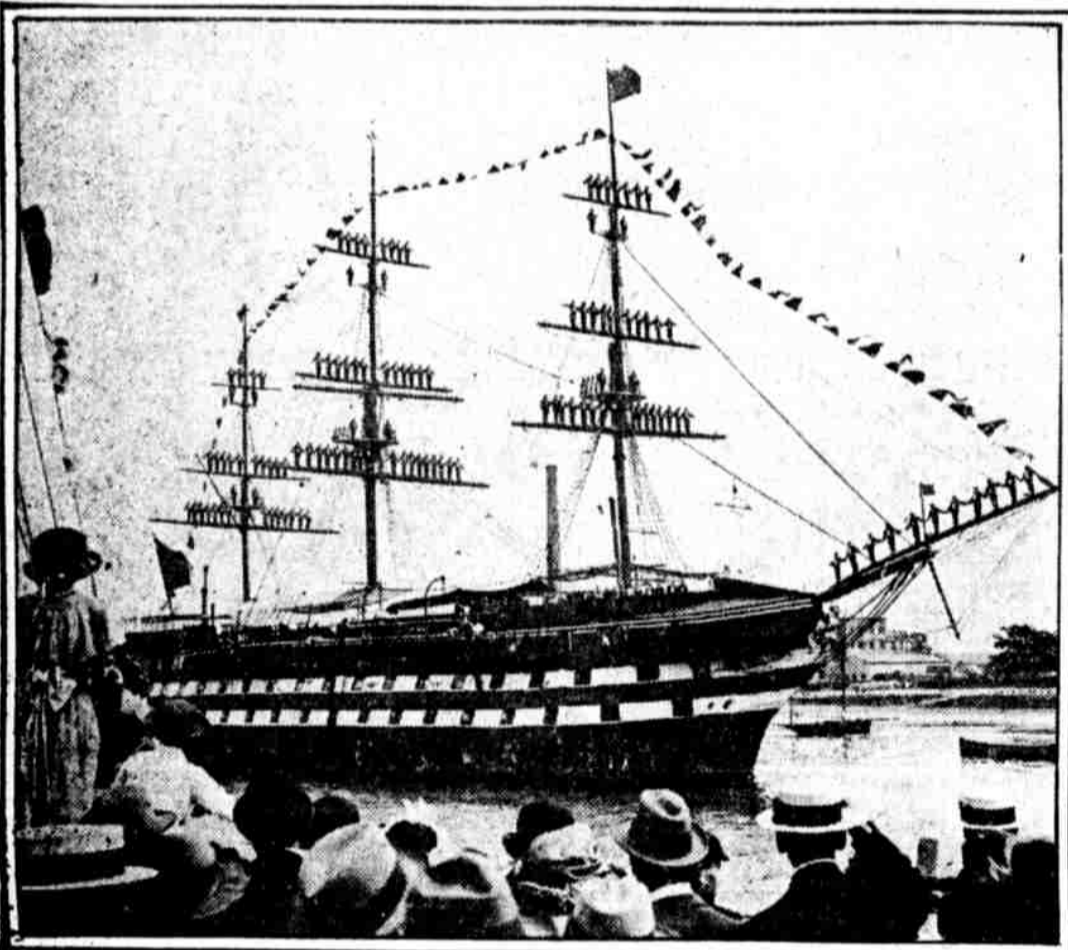

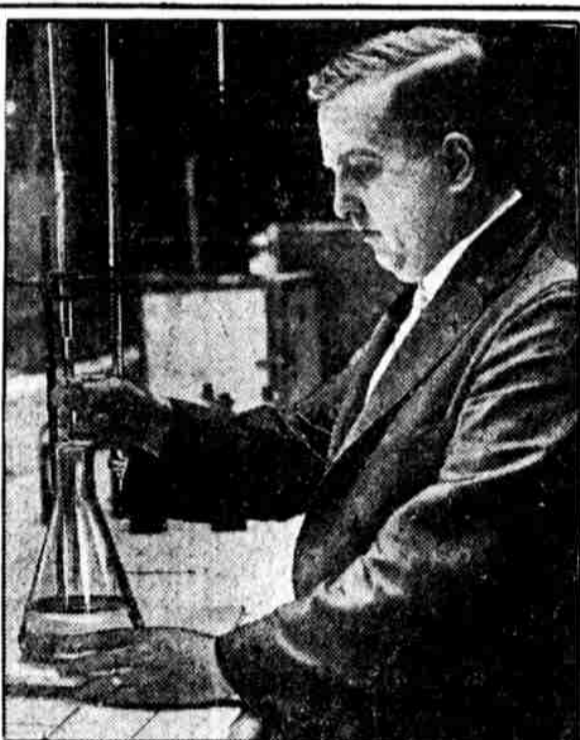

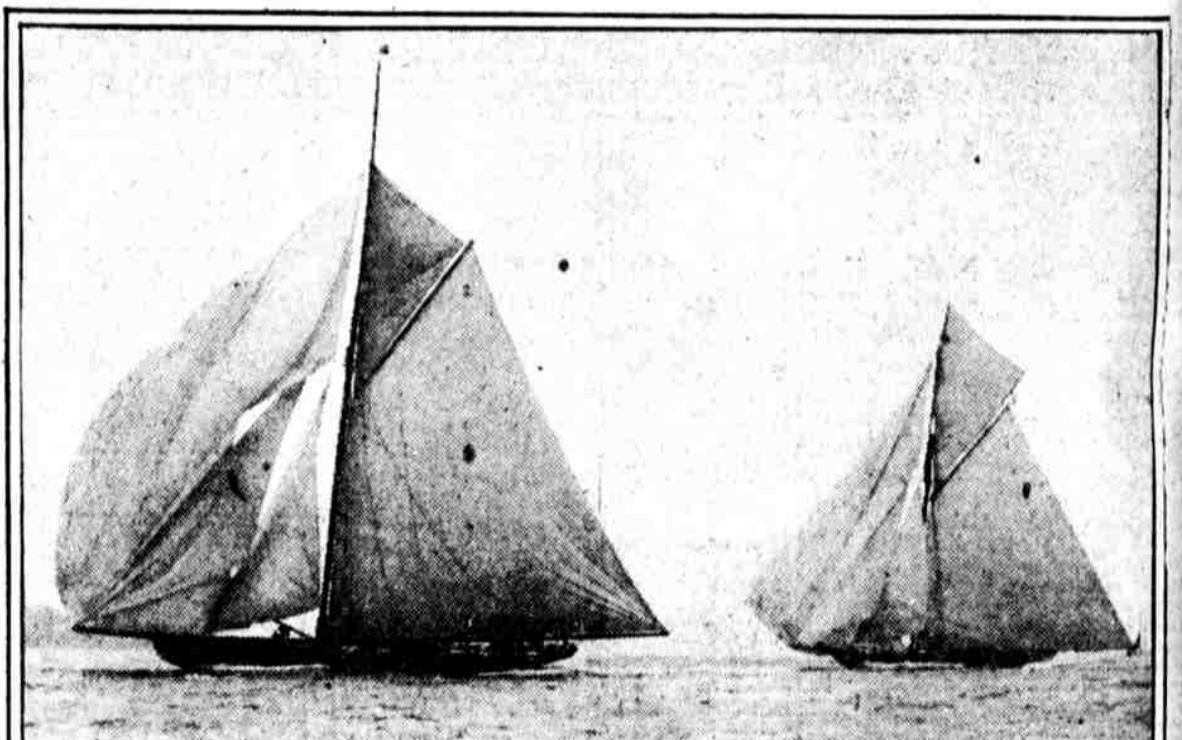

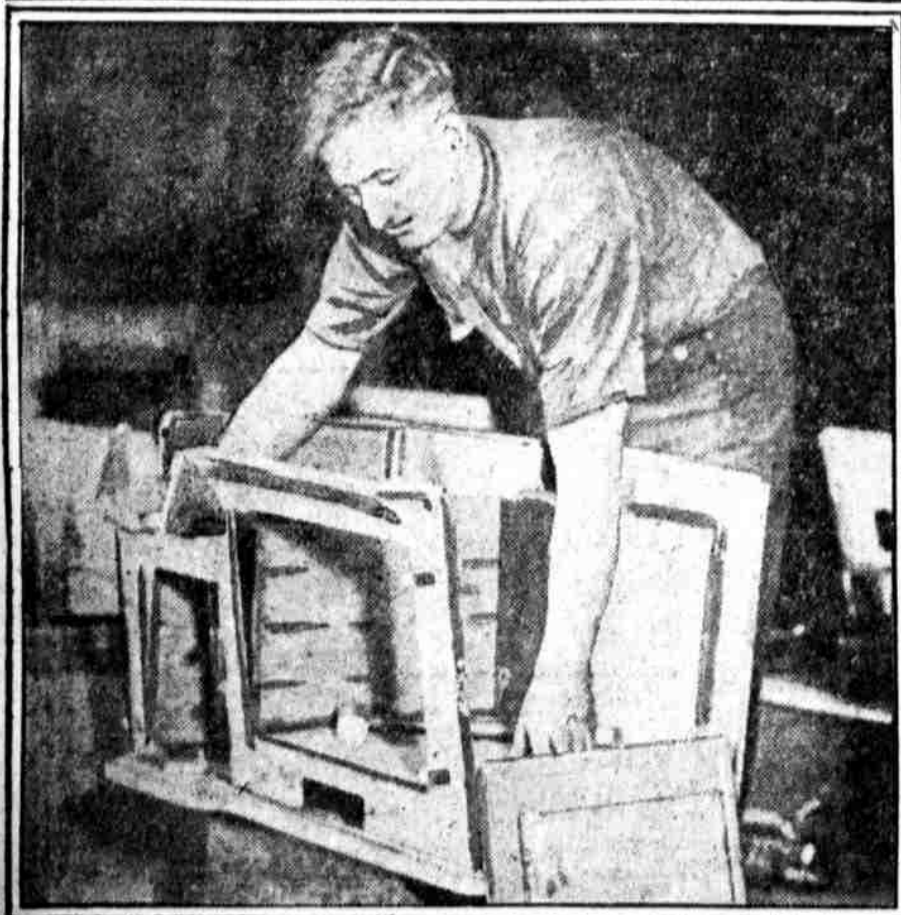


DR. WILLIAM LINDER, chief of the laboratory experts in the Internal Revenue Department, who decides what is and what is not alcoholic.

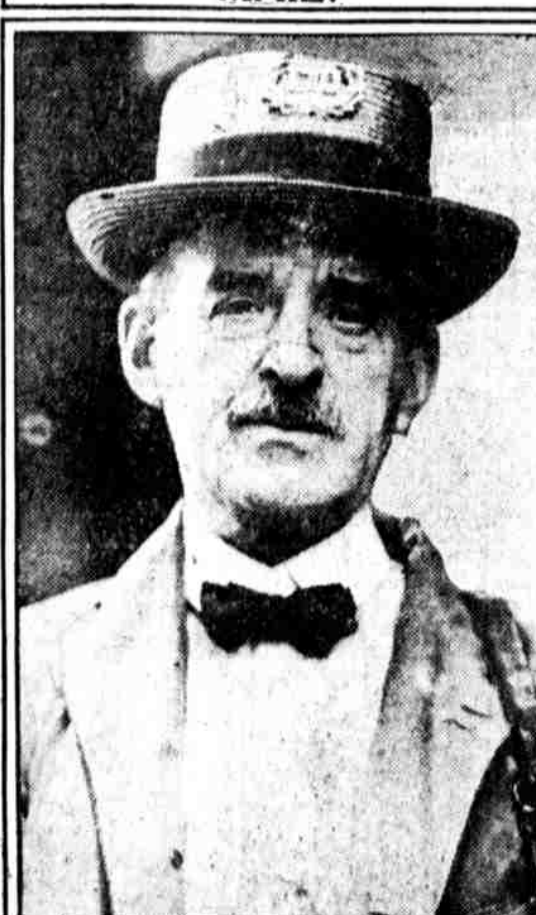
